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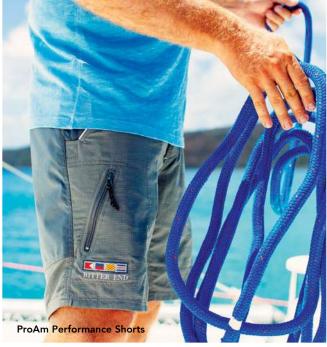


BITTER END YACHT CLUB – GET PROVISIONS ACROSS THE POND

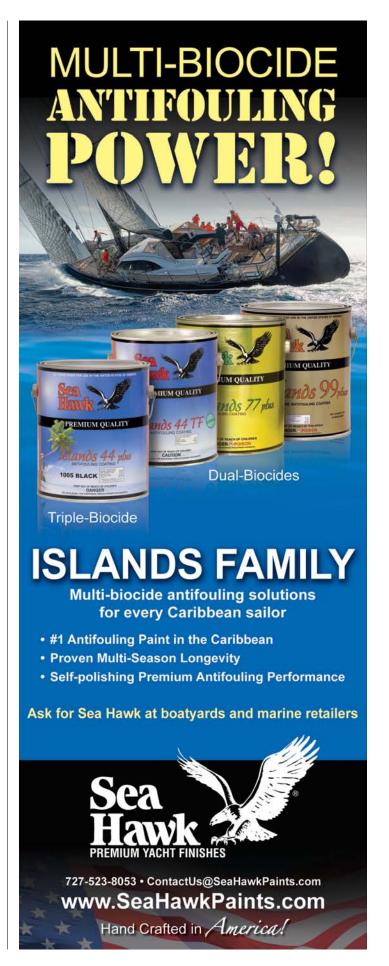

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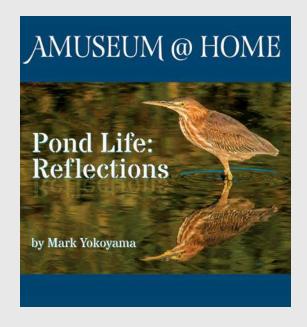

THROUGH MAY 10: Salty Dawg Sailing Association (SDSA) Homeward Bound Flotilla.

While the SDSA has canceled its annual Spring Rally, originally set to depart from the U.S. Virgin Islands on May 4, the organization, has jumped in to help the sailing community by running an informal flotilla to the U.S. from the Caribbean.

"With closures of country borders throughout the Caribbean, boats must stay where they are, until time of departure for the U.S. Boats are not congregating in one or two locations for the Flotilla. We will have groups of boats departing on a particular day each week, from the week of April 12th up to the week of May 10th. As boats get underway, they will link up somewhat with other boats in the group. Boats farther down island will leave earlier, and boats farther north will depart about the time the other vessels work their way towards them. Boats will stay in touch with Shoreside Coordinators by email and Sat phone, and by SSB radio," explains Hank George, president of the Middleton, RI-based non-profit SDSA.

Boats who had registered for the Spring Rally are invited to participate in the Homeward Bound Flotilla. The SDSA will support vessels sailing either directly to the US Mid-Atlan-



tic or New England areas, or west toward Florida and then north along the US coast. Included is weather routing from Chris Parker/Marine Weather Center, offshore tracking with position reports to a Predict Wind shared page, shoreside coordinator support all through the passage, and SDSA assistance in coming into United States waters. To make the Flotilla accessible to all, the SDSA is not assigning the usual US \$150 per boat participation fee. However, participants are encouraged to contribute to help defray expenses. www. saltydawgsailing.org

MAY 24: Leverick Bay Poker Run.

Plans, as of late March, are full steam ahead for this wildly popular event that attracts over 200 power boats.

"This year's Leverick Bay Poker Run marks the 19th anniversary of the legendary event that has drawn the attention of thousands of nautical enthusiasts to the waters of the British Virgin Islands. During the Leverick Bay Poker Run, participants travel over a predetermined route and, at each stop on the way, draw a playing card until they complete the itinerary at Leverick Bay Resort & Marina. At the end of the journey, participants holding the best five-card poker hand are crowned as the Poker Run victors. The Poker Run has become a national holiday in the BVIs, attracting many visitors from the USVI and Puerto Rico," says organizer, Joel Brillert.

A significant portion of donations from the event's sponsors - be it monetary, gifts or in-kind sponsorships - and a portion of the Poker Run participants' entry fees, are donated to numerous charitable foundations on Virgin Gorda. Last year, organizers donated over US \$30,000 to The Virgin Gorda Charitable Trust, Virgin Gorda Recovery Operations Center and the Animal Rescue Control of Virgin Gorda. 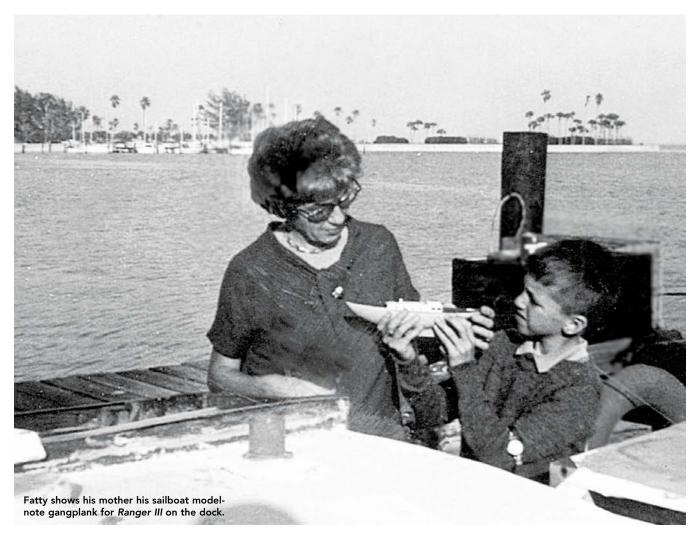

RANGER III

SAILING HUMOR BY CAP'N FATTY GOODLANDER



ne day, at the age of seven or eight, I poked my head out of the schooner Elizabeth—and was amazed to see a large commercial excursion boat named Ranger III tied up on the other side of the dock. This was big news because I considered myself the pintsized king of Slip #7, Vinoy Basin, St. Petersburg, Florida—actually, I felt I was the diminutive King Neptune of the entire harbor.

Who dare they enter my domain without permission?

Its skipper was a long, lean man named Captain Dave Winters. A Florida cracker with thick skin of brown leather, he carried his silence with ease. He looked me up and down calmly—as if in no rush—then gave a tug on the forward spring so I could hop aboard. His wife Irene was slight in build and half his height and as talkative as he was taciturn. "Welcome aboard, son!" she said, "The harbormaster tolt us about you'all and your family's blowboat—We hope you won't mind all the noise but we'll be gone by 9:30 seven days a week—feel free to take some ice whenever you want."

Now we Goodlanders knew about ice and had even tasted it on rare occasions—but ice represented great wealth to us and the idea that we could partake of as much as desired

simply did-not-compute. Even more amazing, the following day the phone company installed a 'booking phone' on the dock and Captain Dave built a wooden box around it—and gave us the spare key.

It was like, well, a spacecraft had landed and started giving out amazing, futuristic gifts. Wow!

Now I had a problem at the time—I was playing hide-andseek from the local truant officer. He hadn't got the memo that we sea gypsy children didn't have to go to school—that we felt landsharks, bean-counters, and other dirt-dwellers didn't have much in the way of useful education to offer.

Captain Dave got a twinkle in his eye each time the truant officer came around and I frantically hid 1.) under the dinghy tarp, 2.) in the port cockpit locker, or 3.) buried myself under sailbags in the forecastle.

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My poor mother—in every port we stopped, she'd end up standing in the cockpit, staring up at hard-hearted officials in leather shoes, and saying, "I don't have any idea where that little rascal is!"

Actually, starting my first job wasn't such a big step—as I was already helping Captain Dave from sunrise to sunset getting the boat ready for the winter tourist season. I just sort of 'oozed' into being the soda jockey aboard. We could carry 88 passengers but normally had 40 to 60 aboard. We'd stop to swim and snorkel before having lunch in Bradenton, Treasure Isle, or Mullet Cay. It was a long day—we wouldn't return to the dock before five in the afternoon.

Sodas were ten cents, and Dr. Pepper was almost as popular as Coca-cola. Canada Dry did pretty okay, too. Sure, we had candy bars, crackers, Slim-Jims, bottled water, bubble gum, potato chips, and snacks—you name it! I was

practically running a restaurant, I was. Not only did I have to make change and guard the plastic bowl of money—I couldn't allow no shoplifting either! Oh, I had responsibilities, I'll tell ya!

And, yes, I got free sodas and snacks from the time we left the dock until we returned—and the only time I took a day off was to visit the local dentist.

Now the deckhand on the Ranger III was an old sailor named George R. Law from Maine—and George reeked of rum, had a red nose with blue veins, and was filled to bursting with sea yarns. He was 'seven times a shellback' (crossed the equator undersail) and certainly the most entertaining adult I'd met outside my family. "The seas would be so big, our ears would pop on the crests," he'd thunder, "and in the troughs we'd snatch lobsters off the seabed in mid-Atlantic!"

Now, even as young as I was, I knew enough not to press George too hard on the facts for fear he might reduce his sea stories to just them alone—and then where would I be?

Now, before we left each day, Miss Girty and her husband Al would set up their table on the side of the road in front of the dock—and she'd bark. "All day! Shelling! Beachcombing!" she'd yell, waving a fistful of brochures. "Three stops! Porpoises, guaranteed! Perhaps manatees or sharks—why, sometimes we cruise alongside whales for an hour at a time!"

Girty was as big as a full-rigged ship—with a hefty top hamper and plenty of weigh-on when in a foul mood. The problem was her hubby Skinny Al—he always carried a nip or two of rum in hip pocket—and every time that a customer would ask Miss Girty about something in a sales brochure and she'd be distracted—he'd take an exaggerated swig from his trusty bottle, and give me a happy wink.

"Rum squall!" he'd cackle as he'd skip past me. "Stationary drunk front!"

"...what did you say to that boy?" Miss Girty would bellow, "don't you go filling his head with any of your barroom nonsense! Cad! Rake! Drunkard! Scalawag! Bottle-hugger!"

That's how it was back in the day in 'newly-wed & nearly dead' St. Pete-most men drank and had nagging women following them around telling them not to. A few men didn't drink—and those were the captains, leastwise according to the US Coast Guard.

With a hundred folks boarding and unboarding Ranger III daily, a lot of landlubber stuff ended up getting inadvertently deep-sixed. Luckily, my trusty dive mask was always within reach. I dove up numerous watches, wallets, and wedding rings—quickly realizing that, while I could recover the item on the first dive, the fourth or fifth dive was always more profitable.

Now Irene had 'a head for figures' and thus was able to tell us daily that we were either going bankrupt fast or going bankrupt slow—that seemed the two marine options. George R. Law agreed, "If you want to make a small fortune on the waterfront, start with a big one!" And as a youngster, I was amazed to realize that Captain Dave and Irene didn't really





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own the Ranger III, that a bank did—and that bank was always threatening to take her away.

Captain Dave was generous to a fault. He was always helping out around the harbor, sharing his expertise, his muscle, and his tools. He never said anything about it but it was during this time that I realized that a sailor's reputation is only as large as the circle of sailors he assists.

Dave, of course, never sang his own praises—but that was okay because Girty, George, and Irene were always willing to. They told and retold a story about the Ranger II when, as a hurricane approached, her engine stopped from water in the fuel—and she would have been lost if not for a good Samaritan in the harbor. As a direct result of this, Dave was always super-aware of his fuel quality and always had a dozen spare Racor filters on hand. Plus, before hurricanes, he was



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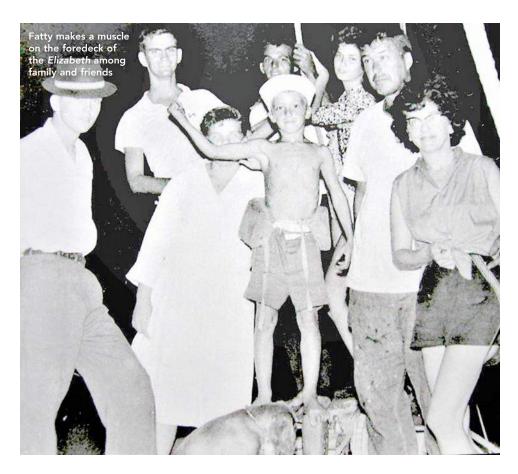


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ly, he'd have me throttle down the Morse controls—and shift her into and out of gear while we attempted to drag/dredge a vessel off a shoal.

These were engineering puzzles to Captain Dave—and I greatly admired him for figuring them out. The more I watched, the more I realized he not only was my hero, but that he deserved to be. He helped people. He cared. And safety was always Job #1 with Dave and with me for my ensuing 60 years offshore.

always all over the Vinoy Basin—helping everyone get ready to seek safe harbor.

Since we were underway seven days a week, we assisted in many rescues of men and material. Captain Dave, once a tugboat skipper in Tampa, was a superb boat handler. We saved many a vessel from certain destruction—and I loved these 'emergencies' to demonstrate our pluck. If a boat could be snatched off, we'd snatch her off—as a point of honor. Occasionally, I'd assist George with manhandling the towline, but my favorite times were up on the bridge when I'd take the wheel for Dave while he ran aft to communicate or whatever. Oh, the looks of admiration from the other kids! OccasionalOf course, reality finally intruded. The truant officer won they always do. I was shipped off to the Mary A. White grammar school on Fourth Avenue at ten and half years old—with a dog-eared copy of Henry Miller's Tropic of Cancer in my back pocket that had all the dirty parts underlined in Crayon.

But we always kept in touch. Years later, in Chicago, I got a letter one late summer that, as promised, they'd be sending me a jet airplane ticket for the big 'paid-off-the-ship'smortgage' party. Alas, it was not to be. Captain Dave had helped one-too-many boaters prepare for a particularly threatening hurricane—and been late in getting Ranger III out of the harbor. She went down with all hands. And as I cried at the news I realized that Captain Dave, talented seaman that he was, was now teaching me his final lesson: that the sea is a harsh mistress.

And that the sea has no compassion—she will take the good along with the bad without hesitation.

A hard lesson, true, but one that every offshore sailor needs to learn. (Bio note: Fatty and Carolyn are somewhere in between Thailand and Indonesia in the middle of their fourth circumnavigation.)



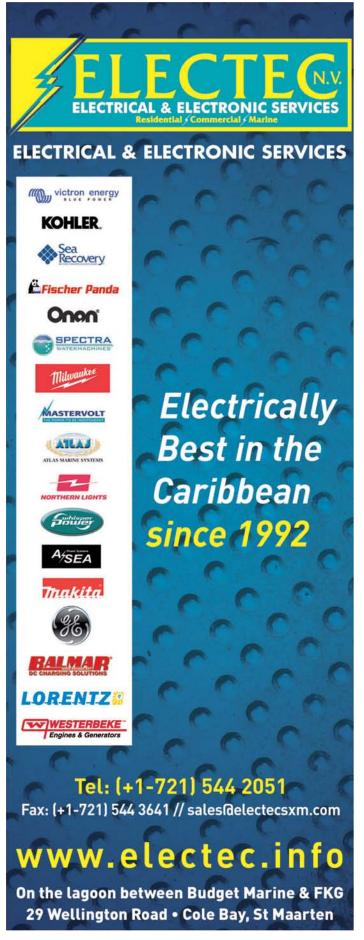


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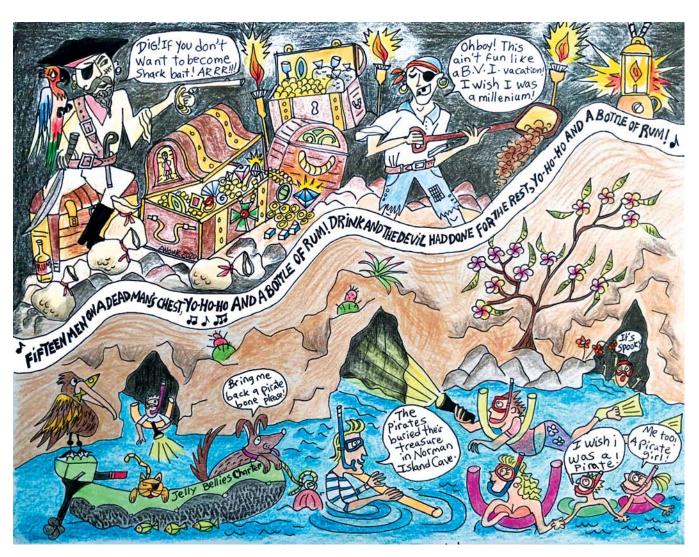

irates, buccaneers, parrots, rum and buried treasure are all part of Caribbean lore and Charlie has been fascinated with it for decades. Today we sail the Caribbean in luxury - generators, watermakers, electric winches, synthetic sails ... Traditional pirates of the early 18th century led a tough life but it was one of freedom and adventure - one with wooden ships and iron men, quite opposite to today's plastic ships and jelly bellies. How did it all start? When the Spaniards, with authority from the Pope, claimed all lands west of 42 degrees west longitude in 1494, two years after Columbus discovered ... India??!!!

El Draco, (The Dragon), pirate to the Spanish or Sir Francis Drake, explorer and privateer to the English, became a hero and was knighted by Elizabeth 1st when his ship the Golden Hind landed a shipload of treasure on England's shores. Drake had pillaged, plundered and burnt many a 'Spanish' possession in an attempt at justice (and riches, of course) - after all, the Spaniard's treasure galleons were filled with gold, silver, emeralds and pearls stolen from the South American natives in exchange for the gift of Catholicism. Drake took exception to this; their decree dictating ownership of the New World and the fact that Drake's father was a Protestant priest was all

the persuasion he needed to exact revenge. Whether he was prince or pirate depended on whose side you were on.

The golden years of piracy came much later and was caused by sailors being released from service at the end of wars. No nice pension in those days, it was fend for yourself, and piracy flourished. Bartholomew Roberts explained it nicely 'A short life and a merry one.' It was better than being thrown ashore with your kit bag with no mates and nowhere to go. Besides, no matter the hardships of shipboard life, there was the magic of sea life, rum, whoring in the dens and rum shops like Port Royal in Jamaica or Port of Spain in Trinidad. And when your share of the last booty was spent it was time to hoist the skull and crossbones and back to sea again. And that's why folkloric pirates are much loved today. As Jimmy Buffet sang, 'As the son of a son of a sailor, I went out on the sea for adventure.'

The British Virgin Islands are home to a true event of actual pirate activity. A huge treasure was stolen from a wrecked Spanish galleon off the coast of North Carolina in 1750. It was buried on Norman Island and one treasure chest was found in 1910 in one of the caves. The story is related in Julian Putley's book, 'The Virgins' Treasure Isle.' Robert Louis Stevenson used many facts from this piracy to create his legendary story and perennial favorite 'Treasure Island.' In it Stevenson quotes:

> 'Fifteen men on the dead man's chest, Yo-ho-ho and a bottle of rum! Drink and the devil had done for the rest. Yo-ho-ho and a bottle of rum!

The island of Dead Chest is just east of Peter Island in the BVI and its profile resembles a coffin, another name for a dead man's chest. Aaaarh – a pirate's life for me!

or over a century, boats have been built and launched on the beach in Carriacou's hamlet of Windward. They vary in size, design and purpose. Some comb the sea for fish; others haul cargo; and a precious few exist for the purpose of winning regattas. For all

their differences, each vessel constructed is done so with the same elements of tradition and nowhere is that more evident than on the day it is launched.

As 2019 rolled to an end, news about the big cargo boat un-

der construction began to spread along with gallons of paint. 65' in length, 18' wide and weighing an estimated 28 tons, she was the biggest one built in decades and therefore, would be the trickiest to get off the beach. The deck turned orange; the cobalt blue hull contrasted by white topsides held firmly in place by bright, bold stripes. As months passed, a list of jobs slowly diminished - sanding, creating a rudder, fairing, caulking, repainting, fine-tuning every detail. Locals kept an ear to the ground, waiting for the big announcement.

In mid February, the fence between the vessel and sea was removed, a sure sign of impending movement. Word came from owner and builder, Nero McLawrence - after carnival, on the first of March, his years long project would be pushed and pulled to the sea.

Early on that momentous day, he and his team, including brothers Norman and Winsley, gathered round the vessel for last minute prep. Logs were assembled for rolling the boat forward; gigantic ropes placed aboard for the tug; supports attached for the cut down. Before onlookers arrived, an animal was sacrificed on deck - an act to appease the gods and ancestors of tradition.







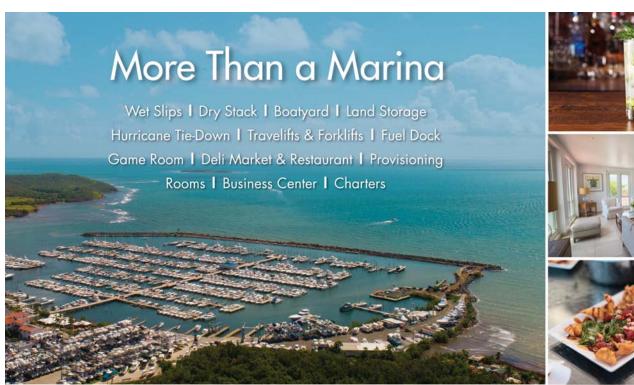
Hymns from the nearby church filled the air as workers hauled giant cauldrons down the path to the boatyard, followed by ingredients for coucou, peas and rice, stewed mutton and ground provisions. Fires were built and lit for the celebratory feast. Church let out and a procession of parishioners followed their robed priest. He climbed aboard, blessed the boat with prayers, hopes, and holy water, then unfurled the flag for the big reveal. *Reality 2* was ready.

It didn't take long for workers, spectators and entertaining advisors to fill the yard beyond capacity. Any available inch was filled with a camera. Jack Iron rum and beer flowed from the nearby Disco and the party took off, island style. The Carriacou Culture Train String Band wound round and around *Reality 2*, blessing her with spirits while tending to their own hydration.

A long plank was bent and attached to skid the boat forward. Three supports replaced those used during the build and then it was time to cut her down. Wood chips flew until the big girl rolled gently onto her side. Holes were dug beneath the keel and more rollers were jammed in.

The all important backhoe was late so everyone waited...and











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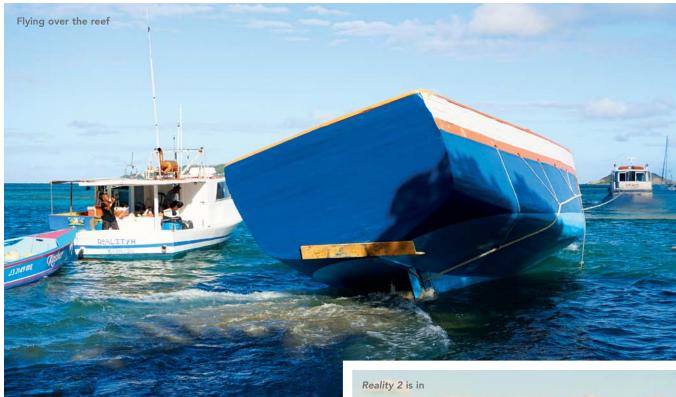




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waited so long, some shipwrights, known as 'old heads,' gave up and left. Just as word leaked- 'there'd be no launch today'- a noise erupted and a yellow machine rumbled in. Driver and crew put it behind Reality 2's stern holding a squashed tire between them. On cue it pushed, and with seemingly little effort, the boat moved forward. Readjustments were made; rollers exchanged places; and she was again coaxed toward the sea. By the time the vessel got to the water's edge, she was aimed toward a stand of mangroves, necessitating a tricky turn to port.

Every break in the action was an intermission; a time to reload drinks, partake of the lavish cook up, and watch the show. Guys dropped the towline down, sending the bitter end through the parting crowd. A squadron of muscle pushed on the starboard side; more pulled the rope, but she wouldn't budge. The yellow hero zipped over, quickly repositioned the vessel, then returned to push from behind. In keeping with the day's theme of 'hurry up and wait,' it ran out of fuel... which caused some fuel line problems...which took a nerve wracking hour to remedy. When the engine roared to life, the fan club cheered, then jumped out of the way.

The towline was led and secured to a steel vessel in deep water



while onshore, the machine sat poised at the stern. Someone shouted, "GO," and the boat shot forward, flying over rollers, the bow momentarily airborne. The tow vessel throttled up and Reality 2 flew down the beach, over the reef and into deep water. She had so much speed on, white water surrounded her stern. Onshore, the void left filled with cheerleaders chasing her into the sea. Hoots and hollers of disbelief, sounds of pure joy resounded. Carriacou pride was LOUD.

Reality 2 was launched that day and with her, the hope that Windward's traditions will be part of another generation.



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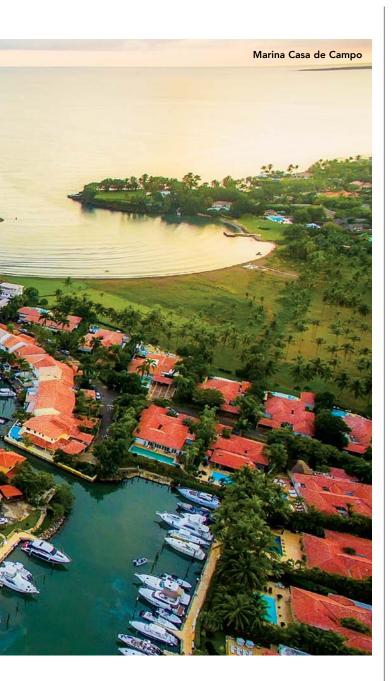
the Eastern U.S. to Puerto Rico via the Bahamas. The biggest barb on this track is plowing into the prevailing tradewinds off the east coast of the Dominican Republic. "It's landscape ranges from the highest peak in the region, Pico Duarte, to the lowest body of water, Lago Enriquillo. Discovered in 1492 by Christopher Columbus, the country overflows with fascinating history, museums and exciting cultural experiences like music, art and festivals, plus uniquely Dominican specialties such as cigars, rum, chocolate, coffee, merengue, amber and larimar."

MARINA FACILITIES & MUST-SEE SITES

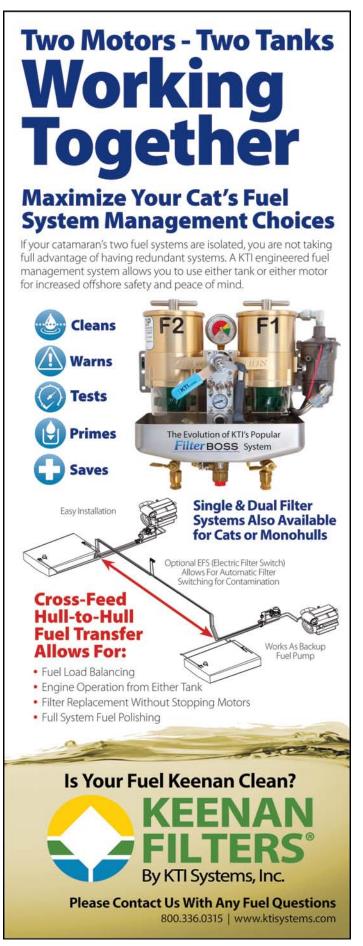
There are over 16 public and private marinas throughout Dominican Republic, from the north coast of Puerto Plata, to the Samana Peninsula, the Punta Cana shoreline and La Romana



to the east and Santo Domingo to the south. What's more, these are easy access to both beautiful beaches, charming towns and in-land roads to explore the country.

NORTH COAST & SAMANA PENINSULA

On the north coast, Club Nautico de Montecristi, located 18 miles east from the Haitian border, is a marine naturalist's dream. Here, is the country's largest coral reef at 160-plus square miles and the Dominican Republic's largest booty of submerged treasures with over 260 galleons sunk offshore. East along the Atlantic Coast, Puerto Blanco Marina in Luperón is popular for its Dominican-themed food and dancing nights, while Puerto Plata's Ocean World Marina livens up with a casino and weekly dance show. Further east is the





Samana Peninsula and Puerto Bahia Marina, which are close to popular attractions like Cayo Levantado and Los Haitises National Park. Caya Levantado is a small picturesque island 3-miles from Samana Bay, where it's fun to swim, sun, kayak, paddleboard and eat fresh fish. Los Haitises National Park's main draw is the magnificent series of nearly 100-foot high rock formations that jut out of the water. The park also boasts extensive mangroves along its bay, cays that are home to multiple bird colonies, and a series of caves known for their petroglyphs and pictographs. From mid-January to March, nearly 2,000 whales migrate through Samana Bay and there's an observatory in Punta Balandra.

EAST BY SOUTHEAST

World-class marina facilities in Punta Cana and Cap Cana such as the Cap Cana Marina and Marina Puntacana Resort & Club present a world of entertainment, from waterfront fine dining to shopping, fishing to diving excursions, plus movie theaters and bars.

"Punta Cana, La Romana and Bayahíbe, a village founded by fishermen in the 19th century, are recognized sports fishing destinations. These, plus Puerto Plata and Samaná to the



north, all offer the possibility of hooking marlin, barracuda, and dorado or mahi mahi, among others. Fishing tournaments are popular here too, with beachside music and plenty of fresh catch cooked on site," says the DRMT's Toribio.









Casa de Campo in La Romana is home to the most prestigious of the country's marinas. Marina Casa de Campo, which offers an incredible view along the mouth of the Chavón River where it meets the Caribbean Sea, is notable for its dockside restaurants and shopping plazas.

"The winter season, from late November to April, is the most popular time to visit," says Vilma Nunez, marketing manager for Marina Casa de Campo. "Our marina is one of the most complete in the Caribbean as a whole, plus we have resort facilities available for our visitors. Inside the marina is a supermarket and

marine store, as well as our new event facility, the Marina Riverside Center."

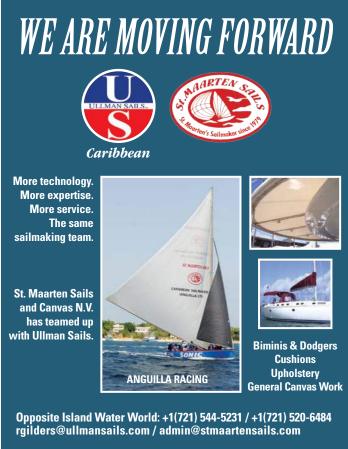
This area of the Dominican Republic is also a destination for repairs. For example, IBC Shipyard, located within the Casa de Campo Resort & Villas, offers more than 25 services. These include electronics repair, hull painting, interior and bottom work and marine carpentry. IBC recently acquired a new lift,



and can now hoist boats up to 300 tons, with a 36-foot beam and 14-foot draft.

"Once work is complete," says Giacomo Moriconi, chief executive officer of the shipyard, "our engineering department provides clients with a visual quality report no matter where in the world they are in at the time. It's our way of being proactive and enhancing our customer support."







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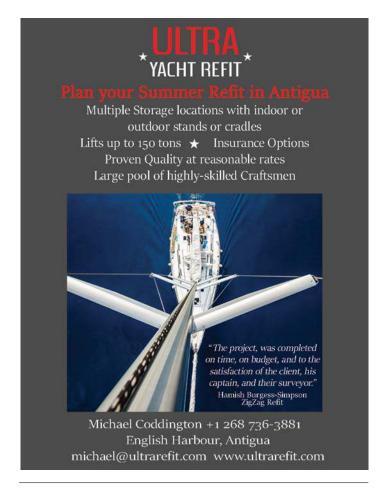
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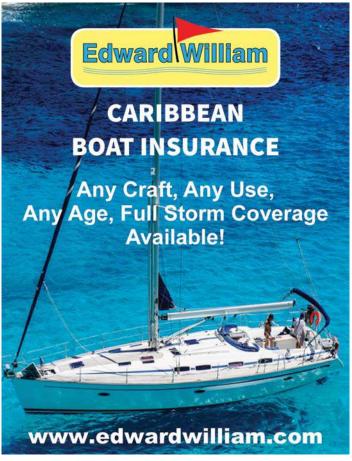
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SOUTH COAST & SANTO DOMINGO

Marina Zar Par is in the beach town of Boca Chica. Twelve miles to the east is Marina Bartolomé Colón, in Santo Domingo. Part of the Sansoucí Santo Domingo Port, this small marina, located at the mouth of the Ozama River, boasts panoramic views of the Colonial City and offers dockage for up to 29 boats and 33 moorings. It's a great spot to explore this historic site and its museums, landmarks, restaurants and cafes. Major marine businesses also base out of the island's capital. One of these is Nautimar.

"Nautimar is the dealer in the Dominican Republic for Boston Whaler, Fjord, Fountaine Pajot (sail and motor yacht catamarans), Jeanneau (sail and powerboats), Prestige, Sea Ray and Worldcat. The main advantage of buying and selling a vessel in the DR is that we have perfect weather year long and diversity of areas for boating," says president, Jose Luis Prida.

Those looking for something smaller need only cruise 16 miles west to San Cristobal. Here Denis Cartier and his team at Abordage craft exquisite model ships in minute detail.

"We build modern and classic models, powerboats or sailing yachts," says Cartier, who started the business when he was asked to build replicas of the Nina, Pinta and Santa Maria to celebrate Christopher Columbus' 500th anniversary of arriving to the New World.

From the north, east or south, the Dominican Republic has become a key yachting destination in the Caribbean.

"The bonus element that keeps sailors, fishermen and yachtsmen coming back is the captivating culture, entertainment and beauty which extends from the marinas inland," says the DRMT's Toribio.



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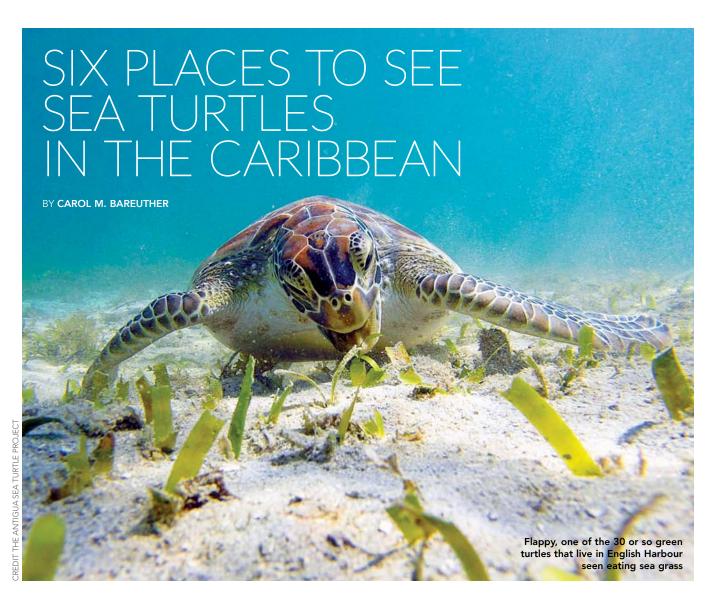
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ales from the 17th and 18th century tell of mariners finding the Caribbean's waters so full of sea turtles that net fishing without snaring one of these beautiful beasts was all but impossible. No longer. Today, all sea turtles are considered either threatened or endangered by the U.S. Endangered Special Act. In the Caribbean, the four most common species are Leatherbacks, Green, Hawksbill and Loggerhead sea turtles. Many islands have active research and protection programs in place, as well as ways for the public to see these charming creatures up close and personal. Here's a sampling of where and when:

ST. CROIX, U.S. VIRGIN ISLANDS. The Sandy Point National Wildlife Refuge, located on the island's far southwest corner, is where visitors and locals alike have enjoyed escorted evening tours to see Leatherback turtles for over two decades. On Tuesdays through Saturdays from April 1 to July 15,



tour takers patrol the beach for females coming ashore to dig nests and lay eggs. On the same days of the week from June 16 to July 31, the focus shifts to watching for hatchlings to emerge from their nests and crawl to the sea. By day, there are interpretative signs that provide information about the turtles and the refuge itself. www.fws.gov/refuge/Sandy_Point/

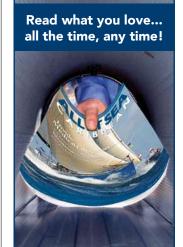

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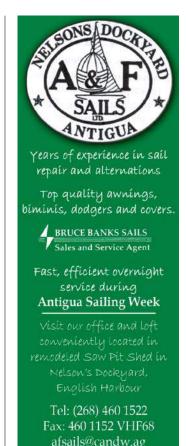
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ST. KITTS & NEVIS. Sea turtles nest year-round on the beaches of this two-island country. Specifically, Leatherbacks lay their eggs from February through July with hatchlings emerging through the end of September. Keys and North Friars are the primary Leatherback nesting beaches on St. Kitts. The nesting time for Hawksbills and Greens is March to December, with hatchlings sea bound though the end of February. These two smaller species can navigate rocky coastlines, so they favor the beaches on the Southeast Peninsula and the Caribbean side of the island, with occasional nests on the Atlantic side. "The St. Kitts Sea Turtle Monitoring Network (SKSTMN) offers two types of tours. One is the Leatherback Ecotour, offered from April 1 to June 1, where guests follow the research team on night patrols. The second is a tour with the In-Water Research Team on Sunday mornings, where participants participate in tagging juvenile sea turtles when captured offshore," says director, Kimberly Stewart. The SKSTMN also offers its Sea Turtle Camp in July, for young people ages 9 to 16. www.stkittsturtles.org

ANTIGUA & BARBUDA. Hawksbill, Green, Leatherback and Loggerhead sea turtles are found in waters around these two islands, with all but Loggerheads also nesting on the beaches. "The nesting season is from March to November," says Nathan Wilson, of the Environmental Awareness Group (EAG), of which the Antigua Sea Turtle Project (ASTP) is part. "Occasionally green sea turtles can be spotted coming up for



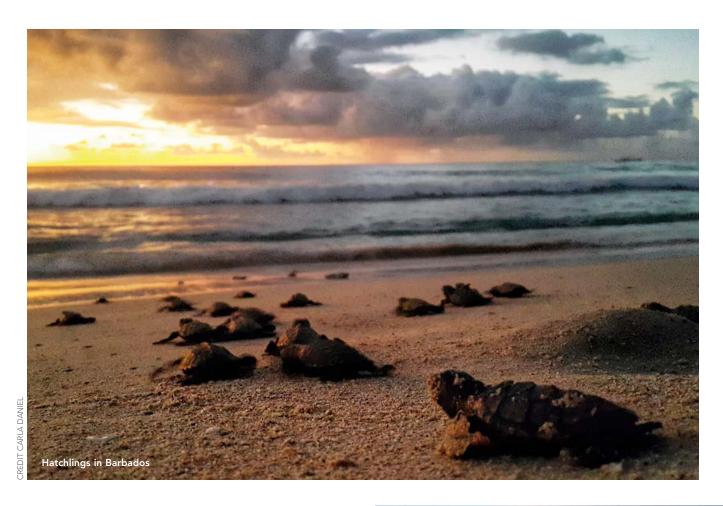
air in Freeman's Bay, located in English Harbour. Hawksbill turtles tend to nest on Jumby Bay." During the nesting season, the EAG hosts paid tours with one of the ASTP's volunteer patrollers to give visitors an opportunity to see the turtles. www.eagantigua.org

DOMINICA. You're never far from a potential sea turtle encounter on Dominica. Good spots to see Leatherbacks, Greens and Hawksbills nest are the southeast of the island around Rosalie Bay and to the northeast near Marigot, both between March and August. Greens and Hawksbills also nest on west coast beaches from May to October. "A great resource for turtle watching is the Dominica Sea Turtle Conservation Organization (DomSeTCO)," says Cyrilla Alexis, marketing assistant for the Discover Dominica Authority. DomSeTCO, which is made up of a network of small likeminded groups across the island, has trained guides that can tell more about turtles and take those interested to an active nesting site. www.domsetco.org



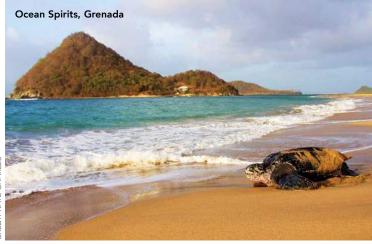






BARBADOS. This Windward Island is now host to the largest Hawksbill turtle nesting population in the Caribbean. This comes thanks to 30-plus years of work by the Barbados Sea Turtle Project, a conservation and research organization based at the University of the West Indies. "Hawksbills nest on almost every beach on the island between June and November each year, with tens of thousands of baby turtles emerging between August and December," says Carla Daniel, the Project's field director. "Each year there are free public hatchling releases, educational talks, beach walks, clean ups, and internships, as well as volunteer opportunities all posted on our Facebook page (www.facebook.com/thebstp). In addition to seeing turtles on the beach, there is also the opportunity to observe juvenile green turtles feeding in the near shore all year round; while swimming or snorkeling or even looking down from a cliff, Daniel adds. www.barbadosseaturtles.org

GRENADA. Leatherbacks are the prime subject of turtle watching trips, according to Kate Charles, project manager and marine biologist with Ocean Spirits, a Grenadian NGO that leads turtle research and conservation and reports on this via their website: www.oceanspirits.org. "Turtle watching trips to Levera Beach, in the north of the island, begin April 1st of



each year and are led by a local community group." Levera Beach is closed from 6 p.m. to 6 a.m., from April 1 through August 31, to protect the nesting turtles. Hence, visitors can only visit on a tour arranged through the St. Patrick's Environmental and Community Tourism Organization, the island's leading advocate for Leatherback conservation. Book early as there is room for only 13 people per guide each night. Spectogrenada.com

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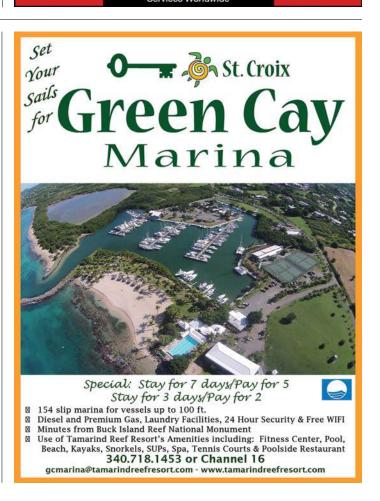


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PYRAT RUM XO RESERVE

RUM BY CLINT AND TERRY BORAM



/e've been waiting for a good time to review a rum that has always been on our boat. Well, it was until we sold our boat a year and a half ago in hopes of downsizing our boating life. Sounded like a good plan at the time. Three surveyed boats later we are finally back on the water and Pyrat Rum XO Reserve was the very first item we put on board.

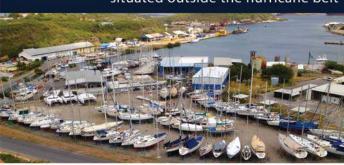
Pyrat Rum XO was launched in 1997 by Patrón Spirits. Patron's business model was to act as a third-party company sourcing what they deemed the best rums available and blending them according to their specifications. Originally Pyrat was produced by the Anguilla Rums Company but has since moved to Diamond Bottling Plant owned by Demerara Distillers Ltd. in Guyana, South Africa. Today Patrón Spirits is a part of the Bacardi International, the largest privately held spirit company in the world.

Pyrat is a blend of Demerara rums sourced primarily from Guyana then blended with rums from various Caribbean producers. Sugar cane is cultivated along the banks of the Demerara River in Guyana and harvested twice a year, extracting



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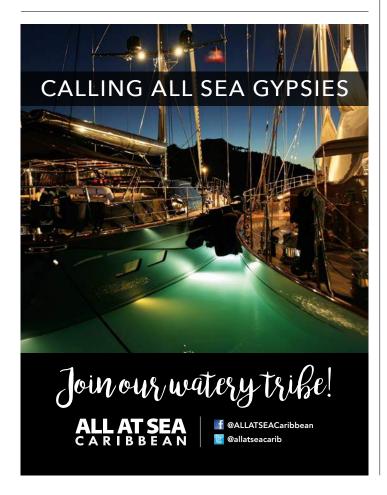
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the juice to produce molasses. The liquid is distilled using traditional pot still methods then aged in both French Limousin oak and toasted American oak barrels.

The rum comes in a squat, corked bottle reminiscent of those used by rum runners and pirates who roamed the Caribbean in the 1800s. Bottles are garnished with a bright orange ribbon around the neck and a medallion featuring Hoti, "The zen patron saint and protector of little children, fortune tellers and bartenders."

HE SAID

The nose is slightly sweet with molasses and orange blossom notes. I get the sweetness from molasses on the palate with floral notes and charred oak sitting in the background. As I explore more I find some vanilla and tobacco to round out the palate. Most of these notes dissipate leaving me a distinct charred oak finish. I like how the rum goes from a sweet to slight florals to an oak finish.

SHE SAID

The golden liquid coats my glass without much lacing. The nose is overwhelming orange with a hint of light brown sugar. It's not overly sweet or fruity but leads me to expect a sweeter rum. The initial palate is nothing like the nose. There is a distinct alcohol note that quickly bites the back of my throat before settling to a very satisfyingly, warm and creamy finish. When I continue to explore the rum I find orange peel and floral notes but above all there is a creaminess to the rum which reminds me of a lighter rum and Coke. I love how the finish lingers.

OVERALL

We began our rum experience early 2000 with Pyrat XO Reserve and it's still one of our go-to rums. At around \$30/bottle it makes a great entry level sipping rum to launch your rum journey.

CARIBBEAN RECIPES BY CAP'N JAN ROBINSON

ncredible seasonal recipes to make in May! While writing this, me, like most of us are "quarantined". This is a challenging time for everyone as we all navigate our way through the Coronavirus crisis. But, as Nobel Prizewinning philosopher Albert Camus once said, "In the depth of winter I finally learned that there was in me an invincible summer." Hopefully for us, that will start in Spring. Meantime, enjoy these easy-to-prepare healthy recipes.

QUARANTINI 'NOURISHMENT & PUNISHMENT'

Preparation time: 2 minutes. Serves: 1 Chilled martini glass Ice Vodka Kombucha (flavor or your choice) Vitamin C - Slice of orange

Meanwhile, in a small bowl, whisk vinegar, capers, chopped oregano, honey, and ½ cup oil to combine; set marinade aside.

Just before cooking, rub swordfish all over with 2 Tbsp. oil and grill, undisturbed, about 4 minutes. Carefully turn over and cook on other side until fish is opaque all the way through, about another 4 minutes. Transfer to warm platter; top with oregano sprigs. Pour reserved marinade over fish and let sit at least 15 minutes and up to 1 hour. When serving, scatter reserved pine nuts over. Fish can be served over quinoa, rice, sautéed spinach or your choice!

BLACK BEAN & CHIA TACOS WITH AVOCADO & RED ONIONS

Preparation time: 30 minutes. Cooking time: 10 minutes. Serves: 4

2 cans (15.5 oz. each) black beans, rinsed and drained 1 medium carrot, peel and shredded (about ½ cup) 1 tsp. chili powder

SIDE DISHES: Cooked Brown rice Sliced avocado, Thinly sliced red onion

1/4 cup chia seeds 2 eggs, lightly beaten Sea salt and freshly ground pepper 4 Tbsp. extra virgin olive oil

Warmed Organic Whole Wheat tortillas Lime wedges

In a bowl mix black beans, carrot, chili powder, oregano, chia seeds, and eggs. Season generously with salt and pepper; stir until thoroughly combined. Heat oil in a large skillet over medium to low heat. Add black bean mixture and cook, undisturbed, until bottom forms a browned crust and most of oil is absorbed, about 10 minutes. Mix and let mixture heat through.

Put black bean mixture, brown rice, avocado, and onion in separate bowls, along with heated tortillas. To serve: Place each ingredient: a spoonful of black bean mixture, rice, avocado, and onion, along center of tortilla, squeeze lime juice over. Wrap and eat!!

Fill martini glass with ice, add vodka and kombucha. Add orange slice. Enjoy!

GRILLED SWORDFISH WITH PINE NUTS

Preparation time: 10 minutes. Cooking time: 10

Sitting time: 30 minutes. Serves: 4

Oil for grill ½ cup + 2 Tbsp extra virgin olive oil 3 Tbsp. pine nuts 4 (6 oz.) swordfish steaks, about 1" thick ½ tsp. honey GARNISH: 4 small sprigs of oregano.

½ cup red wine vinegar 2 Tbsp. drained capers, finely chopped 1 Tbsp. finely chopped oregano Kosher salt, freshly ground pepper

Heat oven grill to 400°F or prepare a grill to medium-high heat; lightly oil grate. Toast pine nuts in a dry small skillet over low heat, shaking often, until golden, about 3 minutes. Remove from heat and set aside for serving.

Pat swordfish dry and season all over with salt and pepper. Place on a baking sheet and let sit at room temperature about 15 minutes.
