


network throughout the area and their experience, and the enthusiasm of their team make them a great fit for our brand."

FIRST-EVER SOLO GLOBE 5.80 TRANSAT CHARTS **COURSE FOR CARIBBEAN IN 2021**

A new back to basics yacht design is taking the word by storm - literally. The Class Mini 5.80, a 19-foot long, plywood, extreme weather, ocean capable, fully self-righting yacht that sells as a kit, either has been or is in the process of being built by nearly 100 sailors in 24 countries since it launched earlier this year. Many, including the yachts founder, Australian adventurer Don McIntyre, are rushing to complete their crafts in time for the historic first-ever Solo Globe 5.80 Transat. This event is set to depart Portugal in November 2021, racing 3600 miles across the Atlantic to the Caribbean.

"At this stage it's impossible to say how many entrants will set sail in the Solo Globe 5.80 Transat, but our 'guess' is 10 to 14," says McIntyre, owner director of McIntyre Adventures, and founder and chairman of the 2018 Golden Globe Race and upcoming 2023 Ocean Globe Race. "For now, we are finalizing negotiations for the Portugal and island host ports with announcements this fall. While I have travelled the world, I have never visited the Caribbean. English Harbour (Antigua) has strong links with the original 1977 Mini Transat but Martinique has plenty of attractions also. I will be making initial



MARIGOT BAY MARINA REOPENS AS SAINT LUCIA PORT OF ENTRY



It wasn't the second invasion of a Giant Sea Snail, the critter captured with Rex Harrison's character 'Dr. Doolittle' in the famous 1967 film shot in St. Lucia, that locked-down borders and closed the Marigot Bay Marina in March. It was precautions against the spread of the COVID-19 pandemic. The good news is that the facility, set in a bay novelist James Michener described as 'the most beautiful in the Caribbean', reopened as an official Port of Entry for yacht-based visitors on July 15. 

BITTER END YACHT CLUB DONATES TO BVI CHROMEBOOKS PROGRAM

First launched in 2017 following devastating hurricanes, the British Virgin Islands (BVI) Chromebooks Project empowers public high school students and educators with learning opportunities outside of the classroom via the donation of laptop computers. In the wake of the COVID-19 crisis, the project has again moved into the forefront by providing



the appropriate devices and resources to keep students learning online. Most recently, the Bitter End Yacht Club (BEYC) purchased 132 additional devices, bringing the total to over 1,000 Chromebooks contributed by a group of charitable organizations to the Ministry of Education and financially challenged private schools in the BVI.

"The COVID-19 crisis has reminded us again of the value of keeping students focused and ensuring continuity of learning via flexible and adaptable platforms for teaching and delivery of curriculum," says Lauren Hokin, a BEYC managing owner. SEPTEMBER 24: Republic Day Regatta.



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


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HURRICANE SEASON & THE CRUISING SAILOR

SAILING HUMOR BY CAP'N FATTY GOODLANDER



ince the beginning of recorded history, we've known that hurricanes exist in the Caribbean. San Rogue packed a pretty good wallop, and was recorded in 1508 and it pelted Puerto Rico. A couple of hundred years later Father Benito Vines started a Met office on Cuba in 1870, and gave a warning of an impending storm on August 23rd, 1873.

In the States, citizens were disappointed by the Signal Corps failing to adequately warn of the hurricane of 1875—hence, the problem of how to get the word out to the public was studied. It was decided that warning signals flags should be hoisted as a storm approached, and a red background with a black rectangle was decided upon. By the early 1900s, radio reports concerning storms were being broadcast to the maritime community via shortwave, with path predictions beginning by the US Weather Bureau in 1920. By 1935, there was a special focus on hurricane predictions; a year later, Cuban weathermen sent a plane to intersect a passing storm. By 1953, storms were being named—after women, the misogynists decided. Weather balloons soon gave way to weather satellites. In 1956 the National Hurricane Information Center was formed.

So, the existence of tropical hurricanes—and their massive destructiveness—has been known for a long time. What has changed in modern times is their frequency. When I first arrived as a cruising sailor to St. Thomas in the late 1970s, hurricanes were few and far between. I remember asking about them when we pulled into Charlotte Amalie. The consensus at the Bilge (the rumshop above the fuel dock at Yacht Haven)

was that, yes, indeed hurricanes existed and had hit some small islands between the Virgins and Trinidad a dozen years back. None of the sailors at the bar were exactly sure about hurricane season—it peaked in either later summer or early fall. Regardless, there was nothing to worry about. Chances were slim.

I asked my West Indian friends about hurricanes—and they, too, seemed to think of them as an abnormality that might happen once-in-a-lifetime but probably not. All their stores started wid, "Me grandfadder say...."

Basically, I and most of the liveaboard marine community of the Virgin Islands just ignored hurricane season until September 17th, 1989, when a category four storm called Hugo stalled over St. Croix and decimated the nearby island of Culebra where, alas, I'd sought safe harbor. (Oophs!)

My wife Carolyn, daughter Roma, and I lost our self-built 36foot ketch Carlotta in Culebra—an event which took us ten years to recover from financially—and considerably longer psychologically. (I'm honestly not sure we ever have, really.)

Since 1989, major storms have been shot-gunning the Lesser Antilles with increasing regularity.

Strangely, it isn't the death toll that makes a storm famous—it is how badly it ravages the corporate pocketbook. Nobody cared about the Storm of 1780 that took 27,000 plus lives in the Lesser Antilles—nor the storm that hit Bangladesh and killed over 50,000 folks via its storm surge alone. It's storms like Andrew, Katrina, and Irma that make the headlines as the insurance companies are forced to pay out.

Sad!

Irma, a Cape Verde storm, struck the nor'east Lesser Antilles in September of 2017. It was a category five, with a central pressure of 914 hPa (27.0 in Hg) and sustained winds of 180 knots, with gusts into the low 200 knot range.

While it did extensive damage in the continental US, it totally devastated Barbuda, St. Barts, Sint Maarten, Anguilla, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands. It caused 134 confirmed deaths with dozens more still unaccounted for.

This was the storm that convinced many Caribbean sailors that NOAA should add an additional 'super storm' category—or perhaps even revise the whole rating system to include future storms up to, say, 300 knots.

Our current 2020 Atlantic hurricane season is expected to be





'above average' with 13 to 19 named storms, of which 6 to 10 could become hurricanes—3 to 4 of those might be 'major' storms.

Why is the prediction above average? Warm water, for one. Another factor is the neutral El Nino Southern Oscillation—meaning there will be no El Nino this season to suppress hurricane activity. Another factor—strong African monsoon rains.

If all that isn't bad enough, NOAA warns that COVID-19 should factor into your storm prep by, for example, having plenty of face masks in inventory prior to the storm—and then practicing social distancing upon survival. (As if residents of the Lesser Antilles didn't have enough to worry about, right?)

I asked my West Indian friends about hurricanes—and they, too. seemed to think of them as an abnormality that might happen once-in-a-lifetime but probably not. All their stores started wid. "Me grandfadder say...."

Yes, FEMA has a free app for that—which will give real-time alerts and share notifications with loved ones via text, email, and social media. There's a list of shelters and disaster recovery centers—you can even apply for disaster assistance online via the app, which toggles between English and Spanish as well.

In the short term, future hurricanes will increasingly use hires inner cloud core analysis to provide better accuracy of prediction—in the long term, because of man-made global warming, it is expected that hurricanes will become bigger, stronger, more expensive, and more frequent.

However, exactly how global warming will affect our weather and, thus, the Caribbean hurricane season, is unknown.

For instance, as the planet warms—it is quite possible (actually, probable) that certain locations will get colder. And wetter. Or drier.

Where drought was once a problem, now soil erosion due to flash flooding may be a factor. And, of course, vice-versa. Topsoil is precious stuff. Suitable soil and suitable weather might not coincide.

Hurricanes are viewed by some observers as giant 'tempera-

ture compensators' and just how all these climatic changes evolve in relationship to each other is a big question. For example: hurricanes might just become fiercer. Or larger in overall area and less fierce. Or milder and more year-round. Or more concentrated for a short duration.

Also, there are 'tipping points' that, once crossed, will be hard to recover from. Since the dawn of recorded time, the Atlantic Basin has had a fairly stationary high pressure system called the Bermuda High. This not only influences the Tradewinds we experience locally—but the entire weather pattern for the east coast of the US and the west coasts of Europe and Africa.

More importantly, these clockwise swirling winds over the centuries have generated the Gulf Stream-which, for instance, warms England, cools the Caribbean, and moderates Bermuda and the Azores.

If the Gulfstream stopped—which it could do with very little notice—most of western civilization would be impacted almost immediately because the crops mankind needs to survive would suddenly have to be grown somewhere else.

Ditto, the monsoon shifts of the Indian Ocean. Without the Gulf Stream or the monsoonal shifts, our 'global food basket' will be in considerable disarray.


Even the Sahara dust the Caribbean has been experiencing plays a part. This 4,000-mile wide cloud hasn't just reduced visibility it has almost put a cap on local thunderstorm activity. This might mean that instead of mid-September being the peak of the 2020 hurricane season—that it might come a month or so later.

Thus, the end of 2020 hurricane season may be closer to December than November. Or, perhaps, the season will stay the same length—and just be more intense.

While much of this 'whether yes or whether no weather stuff' is still up-in-the-air—the good news is that our global civilization has thousands of meteorologists who are watching, measuring, and analyzing.


The rest of us laymen have a choice—listen to our experts and appreciate their informed opinion, or not. We could, for example, elect to ignore the science like America did with COVID-19 and reap the grim results.

We currently live—and die—in strange times. Is our species worthy of survival—or are we simply too selfish to band together for our own common good? A few years ago, I'd have been confident of my answer, but today I am not.






SAILING WITH CHARLIE: CHARTER MARKETING

here's been a lot going on in the world recently - hurricanes in the Caribbean, a virus pandemic, floods, forest fires, a plague of locusts, wars, genocide and starvation - the list goes on; it's biblical. It's almost like someone is waving a magic wand over the planet saying, 'You've been having it too easy, well, here are some more challenges.'

In the Caribbean we rely on rich people - for villa and yachting holidays and for setting up offshore business accounts to mitigate high taxes. Now these two 'pillars' are looking a bit wobbly, not only will costs go up but the inconvenience of all the new Covid security requirements will not be encouraging for would be visitors. So there needs to be even more enticements; waving palms, trade

wind breezes, turquoise water and spectacular sunsets may not be enough.

'Here's how: Start with the first yachts made available by the early charter companies in the late 1960s. Create simulations of sailing vacations from bygone days and compare them with the latest 2020 luxury catamaran vacations.'

1960s: Highlight hoisting sails at the mast and then reefing in a blow, spray flying and drenched crew. Show a terrified crew hoisting hank-on sails and dropping them in a storm and then changing to a storm sail with the boat pitching and rolling. Another crew member being sick over the side.



THEN THE COMPARISON: Everything done from protected helm station; a smiling and dry helmsman pushing buttons with sails furling in, everything working like clockwork; Catamaran sailing fast on an even keel. Mozart playing in the background.

1960s: Arriving at the anchorage and having to fake out the chain and line on deck. Then heaving the lead to ascertain the depth. Finally dropping the anchor hand over hand until sufficient rode is deployed. Setting the anchor by backing down - then calamity, the dinghy painter becomes caught in the prop and the engine clunks to a stop. Angry words heard between the captain and crew. Anchor drags ... more stress.

PRESENT DAY COMPARISON: Pretty uniformed crew on the foredeck pressing a button and watching the anchor descending. Thumbs up from foredeck to captain who smoothly sets the anchor. Snubber line or bridle attached, cool as a cucumber. The dinghy is on a hydraulic platform at the stern, no problems. Final shot of all the guests happily snorkeling.





1960s: Preparing lunch on board. The alcohol stove is prepped for lighting. Huge flames can be seen coming from an alcohol stove in the cramped galley. Black smoke billows over the guests. The fire extinguisher is activated. A guest complains that the beer isn't cold enough right in the middle of all the confusion. Finally burnt sausages and beans are handed up to the cockpit. Nobody has thought to set the table.

PRESENT DAY COMPARISON: Beautifully set table with flowers. Wine glasses in place. A mixed salad with homemade vinaigrette arrives at the table followed by a fresh salmon quiche followed by a fresh fruit bowl with pineapple and mangoes. Oohs and aahs emanating from the guests. Pretty uniformed hostess pours wine and finally presents a plate of Belgium chocolates.

1960s: Guests arrive on deck dressed up to the nines ready to go ashore for dinner. The dinghy is a hard fiberglass design. First lady to board steps on the gunwale and capsizes the unstable craft. Then, the Seagull outboard won't start and one lady gets whipped with the starter cord. Irate captain rows guests ashore swearing under his breath.

PRESENT DAY: Smart centre-console inflatable dinghy with quiet, four-stroke engine ready alongside at the aft sugar scoop. Guests board happily and glide to the dinghy dock where a pretty, uniformed hostess helps them to disembark. Caribbean reggae playing, 'Every little ting, gonna be alright.'

Charlie has been given the green light to execute his idea, 'Now is the time. Luxury sailing in paradise. Today is the first day of the rest of your life!'

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KRAKEN VS. CAPTAIN MORGAN "STORMY"

RUM BY CLINT AND TERRY BORAM



e recently received a comment from Ken about our Kraken vs. Captain article in June 2015. He writes, "May I suggest a Stormy. Get rid of the Coke and find you a ginger beer of your liken. Then compare the two rums. I have only tried Kraken and so I cannot tell you which is best for a cocktail." Well Ken, since we are still quarantined let's break out our favorite ginger beers and give this a try.

LET'S BEGIN WITH A BIT OF HOUSEKEEPING.

We all know a true Dark 'n' Stormy begins with Gosling's Black Seal rum. The company holds two certificates at the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office specifying exactly how to make the drink. But what do you do when you don't have Gosling's on board? As Ken suggests, maybe substitute Kraken or Captain Morgan Spiced rums for the "dark" combining with your favorite ginger beer (and don't forget the wedge of lime.) Just be mindful not to call it a D&S. We wouldn't want anyone to get in trouble with the patent office.

Barritt's has been our ginger beer of choice for many moons but we use Bundaberg from Australia, on occasion, for a creamier cocktail. For this test, we began as testers should, drinking the rum neat to get a baseline, then creating the cocktails using an ounce and a half of rum, four ounces of ginger beer and a wedge of lime.

NEAT

Looking back at our 2015 review we enjoyed the Captain over the Kraken because it led with the cloves and cinnamon a spiced rum should have. This time we found the Kraken to be far more enjoyable neat with a creamy vanilla palate, then a satisfying spice that lingered while the creamy vanilla hit the throat followed by a warming spice finish. The Captain, on the other hand, leads with a strong coffee note before an overwhelming cloves finish. Funny how things changed.

BARRITT'S

The vanilla notes of the Kraken pair well with the Barritt's, the subtle hints of spice from the rum and ginger beer keeping the vanilla in check. In contrast, the Captain smells and tastes like a rum and Coke. It's very sweet with no evidence of ginger or spice. Even the lime can't break through the sweetness.

BUNDABERG

Clearly, Captain Morgan and Bundaberg belong together. The coffee pairs well with the ginger beer; the lime completes the drink. Not quite that patented drink but could pass as a "Stormy" version. On the other hand Kraken with Bundaberg creates a flavorless drink. The sweet notes of both cancel each other out while the spices from both are nonexistent.

So Ken, we can safely say we enjoyed your challenge and gave a slight edge to the Captain Morgan Black Spiced with Bundaberg ginger beer though the Kraken and Barritt's weren't too far behind.

7 HISTORIC CARIBBEAN HURRICANE HOLES



o location is 100 percent safe when it comes to sheltering from a hurricane. This is especially true when in Caribbean islands north of 12 degrees latitude or in the 'hurricane belt'. Boatyards throughout the region are increasingly well equipped to keep boats protected especially in on-land storage. Yet for centuries, mariners have found natural harbors, protected bays and dense mangrove lagoons in which to protect their vessels from storms. Here is a sampling of some of the best-known Caribbean 'Hurricane Holes'.

1. HURRICANE HOLE, ST. JOHN, U.S. VIRGIN ISLANDS.

Located east of Coral Bay, this literally named hurricane hole is surrounded by mangroves. Denmark laid claim to St. John in the early 1700's. The East End of the island, on which the Danes built forts and plantations, was historically the most populated due to its proximity and sea trade with the neighboring British Virgin Islands. More recently, to provide safety from storms and protect the extensive mangrove ecosystem here, the Virgin Islands National Park installed a state-of-the-



art mooring system that can accommodate nearly 100 vessels in hurricane conditions between June 1 and November 30. Permits are required to use these moorings. Still, during the back-to-back Category 5 hurricanes of 2017, many boats in and around Hurricane Hole were damaged or destroyed.





2. ENSENADA HONDA, CULEBRA, **PUERTO RICO.**

This largest inlet on one of Puerto Rico's eastern offshore island's enjoyed such a reputation for vessel protection that it attracted nearly 200 boats for 1989's Hurricane Hugo. Unfortunately, nearly half of this fleet didn't weather the storm. Yet, the inlet, translated from Spanish as 'Deep Cove' is protected by two peninsulas on either side and is indeed calm on most days even when the spray flies in the Caribbean Sea to the south.

3. NORTH SOUND & GORDA SOUND. VIRGIN GORDA, BRITISH VIRGIN ISLANDS.

To the north, where the head of what looked like a 'fat virgin lying on her side' caused Christopher Columbus to name the island Virgin Gorda, is North Sound and Gorda Sound beyond. Four islands connected by undersea reef systems keep the over 3,000 acres of waters here so calm. Seasoned




sailors will tell you it's the east end of the sound that is, well, so sound. However, this is where the Bitter End Yacht Club is located, a sailing destination for over half a century that was blown away by 2017's Hurricane Irma.

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
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4. SIMPSON BAY, ST. MARTIN-ST. MAARTEN.

You'd think being one of the largest inland lagoons in the Caribbean, would surely make this a safe hurricane hole. Yet, the wrath of Hurricane Luis in 1995 caused millions of dollars' worth of destruction to yachts, including damage to historic vessels like Stars and Stripes, which won the 1987 America's Cup. The protected nature of the Lagoon does make it the hub of the maritime industry today, with marinas, marine services and boatyards all located here.



5. ENGLISH HARBOUR, **ANTIGUA.** The British Navy based its Leeward Islands fleet here in the 18th century. The selling point, second to being a strategic vantage point to keep an eye on the French to the south in Guadeloupe, is the storm protective configuration of this bay. A testament to this is historical reports of a 1723 hurricane that swept 35 ships to shore elsewhere in Antiqua, but the HMS Hector and HMS Winchelsea moored in English Harbor had no damage. Fast forward and English Harbor as a natural harbor and several protected bays make it popular with boaters year-round, especially for the many nautical events hosted at this venue.





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
6. MARIGOT BAY, ST. LUCIA.

So well-known as a Hurricane hole, even one of the restaurants at the Marigot Bay Resort, Spa and Marina carries this name. To the point, this anchorage on the west coast of the island is surrounded by mountains, which protects it from both tide changes and devastating weather events. Beyond this, St. Lucia's geographic position has kept it mostly out of storm's way. As a result, and starting in the fall of 2017, 22 hotels on St. Lucia, including Marigot Bay, have launched a Hurricane Guarantee program. This covers cancellations made before arrival and if a holiday is cut short because of a hurricane. Good news if you plan to stay ashore.



7. ST. GEORGE'S LAGOON, GRENADA. Long thought to be below the hurricane belt, half of the boats anchored or moored in this lagoon here were damaged or sank in 2004's Hurricane Ivan, a once in a half-century storm. There are several bays on the south side of the island that can offer some storm protection. Yet, St. George's is the nation's most important harbor. It's the site of the Port Louis Marina, which like many of the Caribbean's marinas and boatyards has a much more modern hurricane plan in place than the old days of simply tying up in the mangroves. 0


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he Sea is the lifeblood of the Caribbean. As such, boats are both an ages-old and contemporary method of traveling from island-to-island. One thing every vessel has in common, whether workboats or recreational cruisers, with one hull or more, or propelled either by sail or power, is the need for repair. Caribbean boatyards are some of the best. Here's a sampling of what's new at yards throughout the region.

TURKS & CAICOS. There are full yard services, including mechanical, electrical, structural and everything in between at the **Southbank Marina and Boatyard**, formerly the Caicos Marina and Shipyard, in Providenciales. What's new is extensive renovations to the marina. "We have installed a new fuel system, tanks, pumps and lines. This should be operational by October," says Adam Foster, marina development manager. New too are piles, frames and deck board on the commercial/fuel dock; 70 floating dock slips with a golf cart swing bridge to access these, and a fleet of golf carts for guests. There's also a new residential development next-door that will offer



"These are going to be the biggest of their types in the Caribbean, capable of lifting up to 30,000 pounds. This type of machinery will reduce the cost of maintenance for vessel owners who are changing their sport fisherman boats for modern vessels with 3 and 4 motors," says Carlos Ponce, sales and customer service manager. www.puertodelrey. com/en/boatyard-storage

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
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
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
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
















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


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


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
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
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


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CARIBBEAN COOKING BY CAP'N JAN ROBINSON

hat was I thinking!? This month I agreed to take part in a 3-weeks gut cleanse, with Dr. Elena Maganto (www.elenamaganto-healthcoach.com) now in my 3rd week. Must say, it is very interesting and fortunately the cleanse has great nutritional tips and recipes; similar to what I share with you now. Here are a few from the cleanse with some modifications.

LOW CARB ANTI-PARASITES ENERGY BALLS

Prep time: 15 minutes

1/4 cup melted coconut oil ½ cup nuts - pecans, walnuts, almonds, etc. 2/3 cup pumpkin seeds 1 tsp vanilla extract

1/4 tsp stevia or monk fruit sweetener, to taste 2 cups frozen strawberries and/or blueberries

Garnish: shredded coconut and/or ground pumpkin seed

Mix all in a food processor and roll into small balls, about the size of a golf ball, then roll in the extra coconut and/or pumpkin seeds. Keep in fridge or freeze. They are delicious snack.

NOTE: You can add or reduce ingredients to get them the way you like.

GOLDEN MILK

Prep time: 5 minutes. Serves: 2 1 (13.5 oz can) of unsweetened coconut milk 1 cup water

3/4 tsp. ground cinnamon ½ tsp. ground cardamom 1-1/2 tsp. ground turmeric ½ tsp, ground ginger Pinch of ground black pepper 2 drops liquid vanilla stevia OR 1/4 tsp of powdered stevia OR to taste

In a high-speed blender, combine all ingredients and blend until frothy. Transfer to a saucepan and warm the mixture over low heat.

HINT: I also drink it room temperature and usually add 2 Tbsp of Chia Seeds to the blender mixture. Enjoy about a cup for breakfast and save remainder for later; either for lunch or when I get a hunger pang!

SAUTEED GREENS

or ¼ tsp. ground

Prep time: 10 minutes. Cooking time: 15 minutes. Serves: 2

2 Tbsp. coconut oil 2 leeks, cleaned and chopped 1 Tbsp. freshly grated ginger

3/4 cup vegetable broth Juice of a fresh lemon Sea salt and freshly ground pepper, to taste



1 Tbsp. freshly grated turmeric or 1/4 tsp ground Pinch of black pepper Handful of chopped fresh parsley 1 bunch of dark, leafy greens - kale, Swiss chard, spinach etc. broken in pieces

In a large sauté pan, heat the coconut oil and add the leeks. Cook for a few minutes until softened, before adding the ginger, turmeric, and black pepper. Stir and cook a couple of minutes. Add the leafy greens and cook for a couple more minutes until leaves are ultra-bright green. Add the broth and cover. Simmer/steam for several minutes until greens are softened, to your liking. Season with salt, pepper and lemon juice; mix altogether. Toss with parsley just before serving.

BERRY JAM

Prep time: 10 minutes. Cooking time: 15 minutes. Makes: About ½ cup Juice of one lemon 2 cups berries - blueberries, blackberries, strawberries 1/4 tsp. stevia or monk fruit 2 Tbsp. chia seeds powder, or to taste

Purée berries in a high-speed blender. Transfer to a small saucepan and stir in chia seeds, lemon juice, and stevia. Cook over medium/low heat until thickened and reduced by about half the volume. Pour into a glass jar and let cool completely. Delicious!

NOTE: This can be stored in the refrigerator for two weeks.
