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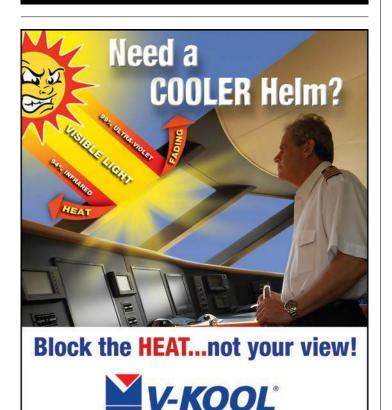
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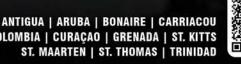




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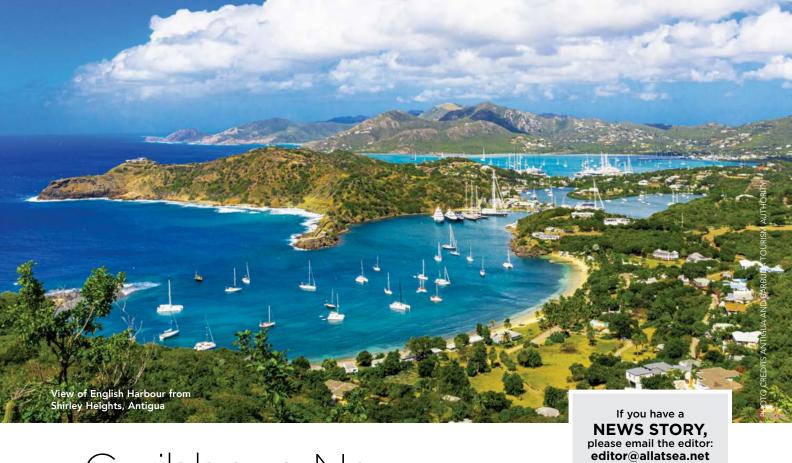

#### ANNOUNCING THE ANTIGUA RACING CUP, APRIL 9-12, 2026 - APRIL MARKS A MONTH OF REGATTAS IN ANTIGUA & BARBUDA

There will be a month of yacht racing fun in Antigua & Barbuda in 2026. The island's Ministry of Tourism, Civil Aviation, and Investment has announced the launch of the first annual Antigua Racing Cup. This bold new addition to Antigua's yachting calendar will take place from April 9-12, 2026. These dates are three weeks earlier than the traditional Antigua Sailing Week (ASW), which allows teams in the Caribbean to race and then head to their summer events in Europe or New England.

"This exciting new and strategic direction comes after consulting with all our stakeholders, both at the community level and those directly involved in the yachting sector. We anticipate a period of sailing in Antigua that better serves everyone, dedicated racers and social cruisers, while celebrating everything we love about sailing in Antigua & Barbuda," says Charles 'Max' Fernandez, Minister of Tourism.

The Antigua Racing Cup is an event designed for racing purists, those who prefer high-energy, coastal racing with a fast-paced schedule and a focus on spirited competition. The event will feature four days of exhilarating racing on finely tuned variations of the adrenaline-charged courses ideal for sailing conditions along the island's spectacular southern coast.

In contrast, ASW, set for April 22-26, 2026, makes a return to its traditional point-to-point courses, as each day's sailing will conclude at a different scenic destination. Sailors will enjoy vibrant after-race socials infused with local culture. ASW will entertain a mix of boat types and crews, and is tailored to cruisers, rally-style participants, and bareboat charter groups. Courses will be point to point for ralliers, and for those who want to compete, additional marks will be dropped, tacking duels commence, and courses timed as the competitors enjoy a different coastal course each day.

"The Antigua Racing Cup is for those on tight schedules

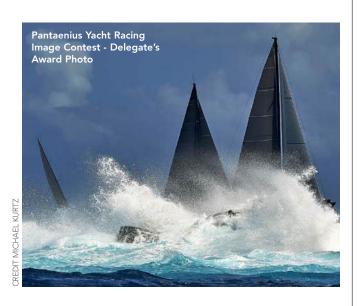
who want a fast, focused, and fiercely fun regatta, while ASW returns to its cruising roots. Having two separate events, each with a narrower focus, will allow us to deliver a more immersive and enriching yachting experience to a wider audience," said Race Manager Jaime Torres.

Additionally, the Antigua Classic Yacht Regatta, taking place from April 15 to 20, 2026, will feature a Model Boat Race. The latter of which will be an exciting draw for the entire family, showcasing boats built by the local yachting community. #### **NEW LINE HONORS PRIZES ANNOUNCED FOR 2026 CARIBBEAN MULTIHULL CHALLENGE**

It's another first for the Caribbean Multihull Challenge (CMC), the only major Caribbean regatta dedicated solely to multihulls. Petro Jonker, chair of the CMC Race and Rally Steering Committee, has announced a new set of awards for the 8th edition, recognizing vessels that win based on speed over a specific course, i.e., line honors. These prizes are in addition to the impressive lineup of big boat distance races with podium spots determined by CSA ratings. Dates for the 2026 CMC are January 29-February 1, in St. Maarten.

Jonker says that based on interviews with owners and skippers of the most impressive multihull builds, racing to a rating is fun, but racing concerning flat-out speed is 'funner.' "Multihull design development is roaring forward with innovations in hull forms, build materials, foils, sails, etc., meaning that owners of the most modern design yachts can reach speeds unheard of in previous years. The CMC aims to encourage entries from owners of these builds, who take pride in their ability to race from point A to point B with comfort and safety. While the CSA ratings system we use is continually improving, it still relies on a handicap system that races to a formula and overlooks one of the most notable features of many new multihull yachts - speed. It is to recognize this that the CMC will introduce an awards system in 2026 that utilizes both a CSA rating and a Line Honor system to determine champions. Top sailing talent from the Caribbean and abroad met inperson and online, June 25 to 28, in St. Maarten for the Caribbean Sailing Association's (CSA) Annual General Meeting (AGM) and Regatta Organizers Conference. A diverse group of stakeholders, including regatta organizers, sailing club representatives, and key industry experts, all came together to elevate the sport of sailing in the Caribbean region.

A key feature of the Conference was presentations from renowned sailing experts, exploring vital topics such as race management technology, environmental stewardship, and marketing strategies for regattas. A new in-depth analysis tool was presented, which is now available to members to understand their markets. Presenters included Damian Foxall and Meg O'Reilly of Marine Mammal Advisory Group, Professional Sailors Peter Holmberg and Anthony Kotoun, the Royal Ocean Racing Club, LV Yachting, Sail Racing Academy, SC2Success, and the many regatta organizers in attendance and on Zoom.

"Our annual Conference has been an inspiring meeting of minds and passions," said Bastien Pouthier, the re-elected CSA President. "In the spirit of our Caribbean culture, we embrace the challenge to innovate and create unforgettable sailing experiences while safeguarding our precious marine environment. In a tough worldwide economic environment, we recommitted to collaborating throughout the year, and this will be evident in our marketing initiatives starting in July, which will allow us to concentrate on the quality of our events."

The Conference concluded with a region-wide agreement on the International 5 Calendar, featuring a lineup of exciting events designed to attract both local participants and international competitors, as well as a new campaign which will seek to elevate the regional events. A commitment to delivering a regional dinghy sailing calendar was also agreed to, with a clear objective to encourage increased Caribbean participation at the youth level. caribbean-sailing.com

## Colombia Protects Coral Reefs in Caribbean Sea by Creating New Marine Reserve

The Caribbean Sea-facing South American country of Colombia took a big 'blue' step forward earlier this year at the United Nations Ocean Conference in Nice, France, to announce the creation of a new marine reserve. The reserve, located near the archipelago of San Andrés, Providencia, and Santa Catalina, lies between 400 and 500 miles northwest of Colombia's mainland. It's composed of two islands and eight outlying banks and reefs encompassing more than 70,000 hectares of strategic ecosystems.

"This new reserve will strengthen our capacity to protect the biodiversity of the territory against pressure caused by fishing and preserve this territory as a protected area for our Raizal ethnic community and the benefit of all," stated Quincy Alberto Bowie Gordon, Director of the Corporation for

the Sustainable Development of the Archipelago of San Andrés, Providencia, and Santa Catalina (COR-ALINA), a public entity that spearheaded the establishment of the new MPA, in a press release by National Geographic.

In 2022, National Geographic Pristine Seas partnered with the Colombian Ministry of Environment and Sustainable Development and the Colombian Ocean Commission for a scientific expedition to study the health of these ecosystems, which had rarely been assessed. The team documented a dazzling array of sealife: Serranilla and Bajo Nuevo banks here are home to over 150 species of fish, 40 species of coral, 25 different species of sponges, and many more species of algae (64), mollusks (11), and seabirds (17). www.coralina.gov.co



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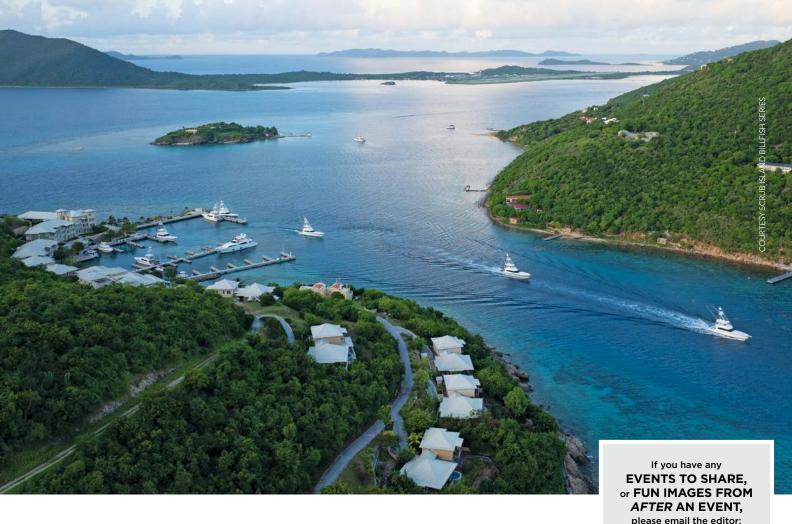

Island Billfish Series. It's the excitement of fishing for blue marlin on the North Drop that makes this two-leg series special as well as exciting, according to Jennifer Dudas, tournament director. "We have added some fun new optional jackpots. One is the Buzzer Beater for the last fish released of the day, and the other is the Last Day Flurry daily jackpot. Everyone has a chance to win something!" Fifteen teams and 90 anglers are expected to fish. Two top boats back this year. One is Marlin Darlin, the USA's Bobby Jacobsen's 66' Spencer, whose team released 16 blue marlin and three sailfish to finish second in the series. The other is Juben, the USA's Billy Freeman's 63' Weaver, whose release of 16 blue marlin and three sailfish landed the team a series third. SEPTEMBER 13-14 | Curação Sunfish Championship & Curação Youth Sunfish Championship. Around 25 sailors, both adults and youth, are expected to compete in this annual event co-organized by the Curação Sunfish Sailing Association (CSSA) and Sailing Club Asiento and held out of the Curação Sailing Center. "We will have two racing days with nine races total, each of about 25 to 30 minutes. Small old-fashioned Olympic triangles," says Alex Roose, Curação region representative to the International Sunfish Class Association. Prize-giving follows. Approximately 20 boats and 100 anglers are expected to compete for the chance to catch the largest wahoo, kingfish, tuna, and dolphinfish. The tournament will be held out of Falmouth Harbour Marina in Antigua and is hosted by the Antigua & Barbuda Sport Fishing Club. New for 2025, "Gasoline-powered boats entering the tournament will be able to refuel at the Falmouth Harbour Marina, all thanks to the newly installed tank and pump at the front of the marina office. Diesel-powered boats can also refuel if needed," says Robert Hall, tournament director. On shore, the Grace Cook-Off Competition is a highlight, with multiple teams vying to impress the judges with their dishes. "This year, we hope to introduce some additional ingredients so competitors can try their hand at other ways of wowing our judges," Hall adds. 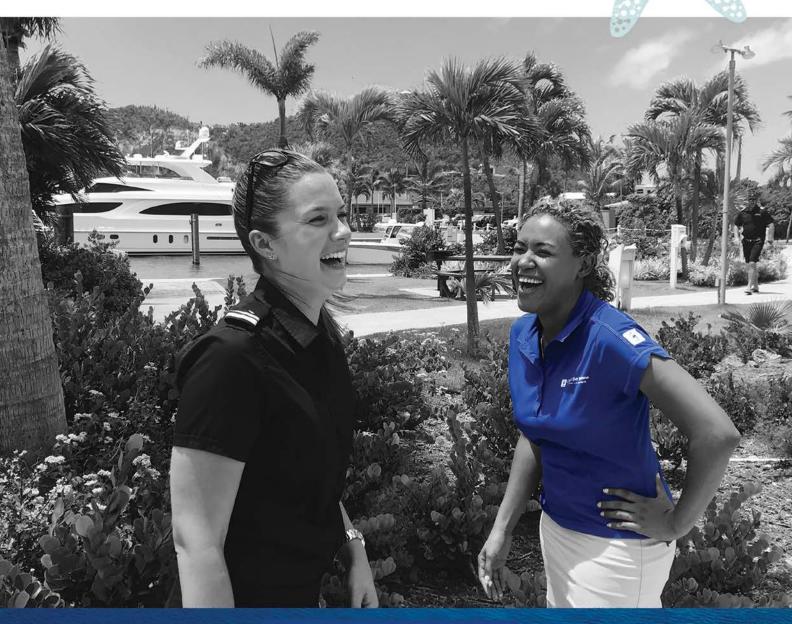

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## The Modern Yacht Tender as Mini Salvage Vessel

ere's the truth: if you're a moderately active, physically-healthy cruising sailor with a normal dose of compassion—you're going to have to *repeatedly* help your fellow yachtsmen in highly dangerous and difficult ways.

I don't mean, like, once or twice. I mean *dozens* of times. I've assisted, in ways large and small, *hundreds* of mariners in distress during my 65 years of living aboard and ocean sailing. Of course, assisting a boat that's run aground in the intercoastal waterway during daylight isn't usually too big of a deal—assisting that same vessel pounding in heavy surf on a reef in the Southern Ocean at night... Well, that can be a whole 'nother kettle of fish.

"What does 'helping' mean? Sometimes, it's only standingby to reassure. Other times it is taking passengers off the stricken vessel. Occasionally, it can be pushing the stricken vessel with the bow of the dinghy. But the most common task is either attempting to tow the grounded vessel off via a tow line—and/or running out an anchor into deep water so the vessel can kedge itself off with its powerful windlass.

Since I've done this many, many times in a wide variety of craft, here are some pros and cons learned the hard way.

#### In a Rowboat:

Rowboats have numerous advantages—often they're first on

the scene if the distance is small. Another plus is that the rowboat has no prop to catch or cut anchor rodes, fish nets, or tow lines—nor to run over swimmers. (On St. Pete's beach in the early '60s I saw a swimmer filleted open by 'prop rash' from the back of his skull to his buttocks—a sickening, truly sickening sight.) Getting hit in the head by an oar tip as you surface from inspecting the reef/hull damage is usually an annoyance, not a one-way trip to the morque.

However, it is almost impossible to exert much pulling-power with a rowing dinghy.

Yes, I have rowed my engineless 22-foot, Corina, and my engineless Hughes 38, Wild Card, numerous times with my dinghy in still water. But exerting a major pull is an entirely different matter than maintaining a slight tug on the line with enough pressure to allow the towed vessel to drift through the water in a consistent direction.

At first, in fact, it appears as if the oars are doing nothing. Keep at it. Put your back into it. Don't use your arms, use your buttocks and legs. Stay the course! And eventually, sans wind and current, even a 20,000-pound vessel will follow docilely, like a sledge being pulled by an ant.

And rowing tenders can be useful for passing Nylon rodes/ towlines out to larger vessels in deep water that can pull with good effect.

Here are the disadvantages of using a rowing dinghy to lend assistance in an emergency: One, they're tippy. Two, they're hard fiberglass or wood, which means that they can severely damage the hull and smash your fingers. Three, oars are clumsy in a spiderweb of lines or while being crushed between the stricken vessel and a dozen other small craft attempting to help. Four, vessels that row well tend to have very little buoyancy aft—so hoisting a heavy or stuck anchor off the bottom is out of the question. Five, things can get ugly quick—as anyone in a rigid tender that's been inadvertently pulled under the counter of a hobby-horsing vessel will attest. Six, once a rowboat gets muddy, it gets extremely slippery and the danger quadruples.

Now here's a basic truism of all 'towing off or kedging off' situations—you don't pull a line out from the stricken vessel in a rowboat, you take the line and its anchor in the small boat and then 'pay it out' as you move away. This not only allows you to get the kedge anchor the max distance away from the grounded vessel, but its exact placement is easier as well.

It is impossible to 'pull out chain' but it isn't impossible to 'pay out' chain as you row away if you can control its escape!





From 1977 to 1989 I had only a ten-foot (a lovely George Lawley design) rowing dinghy while ocean-sailing on my self-constructed Endurance 36, Carlotta. Why? For numerous reasons—one, I was broke; two, I liked the exercise, and three, it allowed me to sail across oceans with my wife and (eventual) child without carrying explosive gasoline aboard.

#### Here's how I'd typically 'tow out an anchor' from a grounded vessel:

First off, I took my time preparing so that the time I spent actually accomplishing the goal was as brief as possible. Example: I prepared the anchor to 'flip' into the water versus being lifted and tossed, because this is extremely time consuming when the weight of the rode is yanking you back towards the stricken vessel.

Second, I'd have them give me the entire nylon rode (or, god forbid, pile of chain) and place it aft in the dinghy (so that if it got away from me, it wouldn't whip me in, say, in the head). Bear in my mind that it is easy to injure or kill yourself while playing such games.

Third, I'd place the rode to be paid out in the deep notch I've cut in my dinghy's teak transom—and use my Topsider-clad foot as a friction clutch jammed against the athwartship front bulkhead of my aft thwart.

I'm a man—a stoooooopid man, sometimes: and a man with more balls than brains often; but that's what I am... even at the age of seventy-three and counting.

This would allow me not only to control the line feed speed as I rowed away—but its tension as well. (Adding a little tension can keep it from fouling coral heads just beneath the surface.)

Hint: Don't use all your energy early, as the end of the process is the most difficult under oars.

Once I have rowed to where I want to be, I take away my foot, take a final stroke on my oars, and tip over the anchor into the water—all at the same time.

This is dangerous—but often necessary. Is there a chance of severe injury? Yes. But if you want to circumnavigate numerous times as I have—you've probably already decided whether you're a man or a mouse.

I'm a man—a stoooooopid man, sometimes; and a man

with more balls than brains often; but that's what I am... even at the age of seventy-three and counting.

Oh-before I forget: a notch in the transom can be marvelous—adding a rubber trailer roller to that notch can be perfection. My friend Larry has a light ten-foot plywood tender called the Vicar of Bray. It has a tiny foredeck. Under that foredeck Larry keeps a small, detachable plank with a bow roller at one end that projects slightly over the bow—and self-hooks into the foredeck's aft bulkhead. Thus, Larry can use his ten-footer almost as a tugboat after hurricanes to help his beached friends.

One of the coolest, most creative ideas along these lines is a Kiwi sailor who would flop-out a pre-measured car mat over the bow of his inflatable. This thick plastic car mat not only had a roller chock (riveted in place, to lessen abrasion) forward—and three pre-arranged shock cords to hold it in place at the bow towing ring and aft on two sides.

This looked totally stupid and worked amazingly well!

What about a small tender with an outboard?

Outboards on the transom are a mixed blessing. Not only do they delight in wrapping nylon rodes in their blades—they also enjoy breaking their shear pins as the straight-hanging chain comes in contact with a spinning prop.

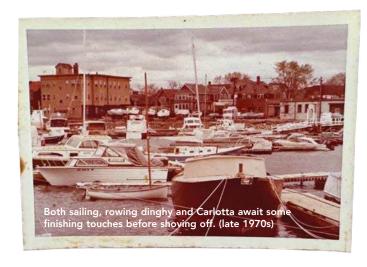
If my (long suffering) wife Carolyn is there to help, I often steer my tender backwards while she pays out the rode from the bow. This keeps the nylon cordage or chain away from the prop—while only lessening the outboard's pulling power a bit. (Yes, my 2 HP Tohatsu doesn't have reverse—I just spin and hold at 180 degrees... making sure it doesn't flip the dinghy while at ninety-degrees.)

Bigger Boats, say 22-foot T-tops: Since these boats can pull so well in the hands of an experienced seaman, they are of great value—but in the hands of your average American halfdrunk, stinkpotting throttle-jockey... well, not so much.

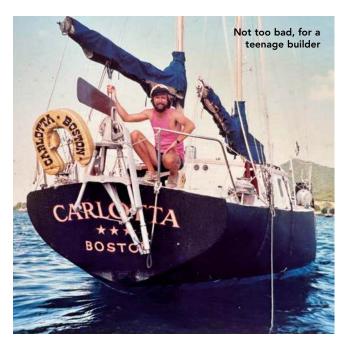
Which brings us to Towing Posts. Tugboats can ably assist freighters not only because of their massive pulling/pushing power, but because their prop is aft of their towing post. The physics of this is vital to understand.

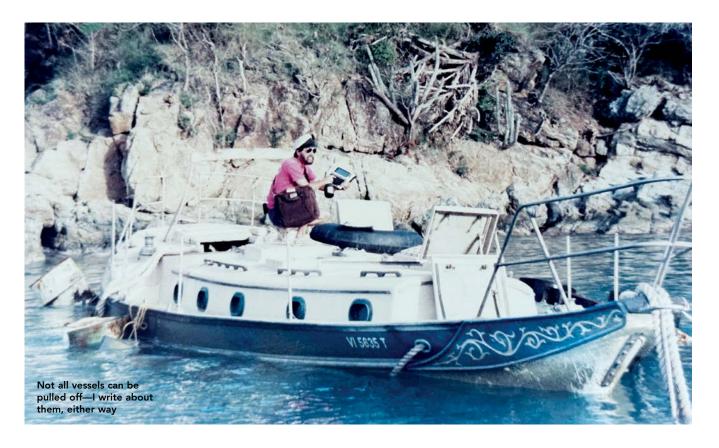
A vessel with a tow post forward of its prop can always manage the angle it wants to be at whether it is moving through the water or not.

This is much safer and a huge towing advantage.









Most boats don't have towing posts—so 'throw me a line' type rescues often consist of a powerboat taking a strain on the tossed line and its prop wash slowly 'walking' the vessel sidewise onto the reef.

#### Oops.

What about towing *bridles* for towing vessels without towing posts? Well, they can help a lot in open water while towing in a straight line—but they don't do much in close quarters. Anyone who has tried to tow a large vessel from a small one knows the problem—the dinghy pulls strongly to whichever side of the outboard (prop, really) the tow line is on.

Bridles work best with a single snatch block on the tow line—that way it slides effortlessly rather than rachet/jumps.

One quick & dirty semi-solution is to put a circle of line around the entire (well-clamped) outboard—and arrange it so that line doesn't damage the gasoline hose or shifting lever.

Don't forget **inertia**! I've seen this happen a dozen times. A light towboat or small dinghy tows a heavy sailboat into the harbor at six knots—and stops just before an open slip. The 20,000 lb sailboat doesn't slow at all—just smashes into the

Remember, we all have different levels of expertise—and different panic levels as well. I once helped rescue a newbie captain pounding on a reef who kept asking me, again and again, if his boat was, indeed, being smashed to smithereens on a reef.

towboat... and, well, anything else extremely expensive that happens to be in the area.

Note: never **ever** accept a towline and put its splice over your bitts. This can't be released under pressure—and you've just given command of your vessel to someone else. If you're handed a tow line with a splice, just choke a couple of feet and tie it off. Now, you can cast it off instead of watching in utter horror as you're savagely yanked into a fleet of expensive Fabergé eggs!

...or towed under a bridge!

Swimming? Can an anchor be swam out? No. It's almost always

too heavy. But if the bottom is sandy and shallow, it *can* be s-lo-w-l-y dragged five or six feet at a time by a snorkeler walking backwards on a sandy bottom. This takes forever—and unless there are two or three divers taking turns, is almost impossible.

On my second circumnavigation, while crossing the Pacific where sailors from the US and Australia often drag anchor in the deep anchorages of Polynesia, I carried a dedicated aluminum anchor with 300 feet of braided 3/8th inch nylon. (Don't use twisted three-strand, it always hockles under extreme load.)

With this *dedicated anchor set up*, I could place the anchor quickly and run it back to the stricken vessel in moments, before the boat in the breaking surf could wedge itself further up the reef. Seconds count! And you'd be amazed how well this light tackle can hold in firm sand.

What's the bottom line?

The best (if imperfect) solution/tender is, in my humble opinion, a RIB.

They are stable and have tremendous buoyancy. Plus, they are roomy. Even better, they don't damage the stricken vessel (or its self-steering gear) further.

Those are the pluses—cancelled out by these negatives: There's nothing to tie-to that won't rip away. Anchors are often sharp and the rusty chain is highly abrasive—and inflatable boats are just expensive bits of rubber-impregnated fabric. (Moused bow shackles and D-shackles with jagged cotter pins can be as sharp as scalpels!)

So, here's the reality—if you go to help a hapless vessel that has just sailed onto a reef, you're probably gonna damage your inflatable. I have, many times.

...nobody said being a Good Samaritan would be cheap or easy.

If time is *really* of the essence and I'm on the brand-new Caribe 10.5's that I begrudging buy every 12 years or so, I have the stricken vessel's anchor lowered to the surface of the water. Then, from the bow of the inflatable, I pass a light line through the anchor's shackle. I then (if an all-line rode) tow (in reverse) that underwater anchor out to blue water as its rode is paid out (they often jam, alas) by the foredeck crew of the grounded vessel until my dinghy is in place.

Then, I put a major strain on the rode to straighten and stretch

it as much as possible and then cast off one end of the restraining line that I had put through the anchor's shackle.

It drops to the bottom without ever having been in my dinghy.

With luck, I've quickly placed the anchor in deep water with more than 7-to-1 scope without slicing my dinghy to ribbons... or even getting myself dirty.

However, to be honest, most of the time I either badly damage my dinghy or, at minimum, dirty it up beyond belief.

And the big problem with this method is that the anchor rode often keeps jamming and the folks on the foredeck don't know how to efficiently clear it.

Oh, incidentally, gloves and foot gear are a must when dealing with sharp anchors and abrasive chain in close quarters.

I offer these suggestions, dear reader, not because I have any particularly clever insights, but because if we yachties like to pre-think some of these 'emergency' procedures before we're attempting to implement them with breaking waves pushing the stricken 20-ton vessel further up the frothing beach. Well, the more we pre-think these problems, the safer and more effective we can be as salvors and friends.

I enjoy helping others. I couldn't live with myself if I just watched when I could be helping. We're all in this game of life together. If this article prompts just one yachtie to cut a notch in his dinghy transom or pre-rig a towing bridle or carry a 'keep away' anchor with a long rode in the bow of their dinghy while crossing the Pacific... Well, my time wasn't wasted.

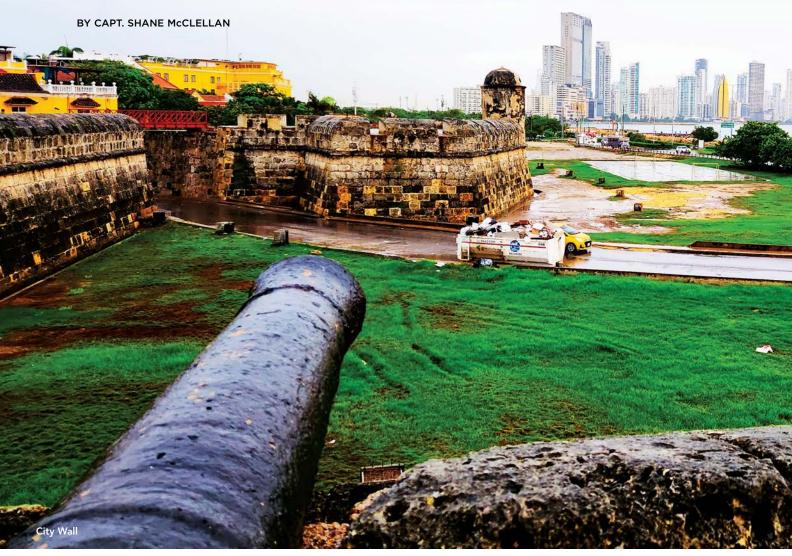
Remember, we all have different levels of expertise—and different panic levels as well. I once helped rescue a newbie captain pounding on a reef who kept asking me, again and again, if his boat was, indeed, being smashed to smithereens on a reef.

"...but it can't be a reef," he kept saying, "It's not on my screen!"

That's one of the most distressing problems with life in the wild—it can be far different from the digital serenity of your screen.

### Walls, Forts, and Hidden Towns: A Journey Through Northern Colombia



uring the offseason, my wife and I left our catamaran in Panama and took a two-month trip around the northern part of South America starting in Cartagena, Colombia. This is an amazing Spanish colonial town that is popular with boaters and if you ever visit you would be remiss if you did not venture to some of the surrounding areas. That is why this top ten list is not just the city of Cartagena, but also sites up to a six-hour drive away. Also, while there are beaches and reefs around Cartagena you must take a tour boat to get to them and since we just spent two months in the San Blas islands, we

chose to skip them and focus on the land-based exploration. Here we go with our top ten places in Cartagena and the surrounding area.

10 City wall – The walls around Cartagena were started in 1586 and continue to be built for over 200 years and today they are very well preserved. They were mostly used to fend off pirate attacks after Sir Francis Drake attacked in 1586. They are almost seven miles long and walking along them gives a great view of the sea and the high-rise area of Cartagena.





Churches - Like most Spanish colonial towns, Cartagena has its fair share of churches. The cathedral is a bit stark on the inside and the oldest church is Santa Domingo built in 1552. Our favorite church was the Convento & Iglesia de San Pedro Claver, which was named after a man who





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spent 40 years working for the rights and well-being of slaves and is now the patron saint of human rights.

Barranquilla - We stopped at this town on the way to another place that will show up later on this list. We found the Gran Malecón to be peaceful as you walk along the river at night. Barranquilla is well-known for its carnival and the museum of the carnival was very interesting. My Latina wife loved the fact that this is the hometown of Shakira and Sofía Vergara.

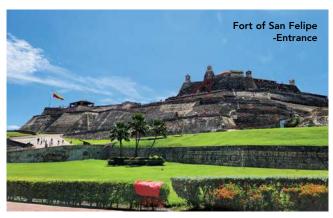
Museo del Oro y Arqueología - This is the Gold and Archaeological Museum and while the gold museum in Bogota is much better what my wife and I loved about this museum was the focus on the native people's achievements of controlling the local river with canals and they're impressive pre-Columbian silver and gold work. This exhibit actually led us to purchasing her a set of earrings when we were in Mompox, which we'll talk about in a little bit.

Puerta Del Reloj -This is the Gate of the Clock and is one of the gates into the walled historic colonial town. Just inside you will find the Plaza de la Coches (Square of the Carriages) and this was the site of one of the largest slave markets in Latin America. Today this plaza is filled with shops and restaurants and is a very vibrant place to take in the atmosphere of the city.



Museum Of Cartagena de Indias - This museum has several different subjects but the main one is about the Spanish Inquisition. Sadly almost 700 people were tortured and executed for crimes against the Catholic Church at this very site. Some of those crimes even included Jesuits priests who simply stood up for the rights of slaves. Underneath the pictured platform was a room and going inside you could feel the weight of the history of this site weighing down on you.





Fort of San Felipe - After the city wall was built the officials of Cartagena decided they needed a fort which was begun in 1657 and became the largest fort built by the Spanish Empire in the New World. It was also built to protect all the gold that was being shipped back to Spain. Visiting the fort is at least a half a day due to the massive size and our favorite part was the extensive tunnel system running throughout the fort.

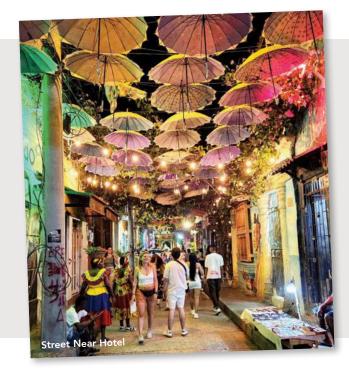


Tayrona National Park – Past Barranquilla and the town of Santa Marta is a wonderful National Park situated between the mountains and the ocean. Once you get to the entrance of the park you have to park your car and hike in going up and down hills and along the beach. On the way there are several locations where you can rent a hammock or a tent and other places to get a bite to eat or a drink. Within the park you will find monkeys, birds, and reptiles and it is just absolutely wonderful. The only negative is that it gets hot, very hot.



Santa Cruz de Mompox − During the colonial times this small village was used as a resting point for boats traveling up the river. Due to this it became quite wealthy and even today you can see that wealth in the churches and the homes. Not many people visit Mompox, but if you do you will be rewarded with a relaxed pace to enjoy your days. Taking a boat tour up the river and a tuk-tuk tour of the town all the churches were highlights for us. Our favorite church was Iglesia de Santa Barbara with the Moorish style bell tower you can climb up and check out the second story balcony. At night we enjoyed walking along the river with the various restaurants and shops lining it. Plus, this is where we got the before mentioned earrings.





Architecture & Atmosphere - I would love to give you a specific location for our number one spot, but both of us just really enjoyed walking around the old town of Cartagena. The architecture shows off the beautiful Spanish colonial style and the atmosphere was just wonderful. We saw streets that were covered by umbrellas that lit up at night. To be honest, we just couldn't get enough of just walking around and seeing everything and everyone going about their day. A fun way to experience this quickly is on a Chiva Bus. This is a double-decker party bus that drives people around the city while showing them the sites, but it seems more fun and livelier than your typical sightseeing buses.

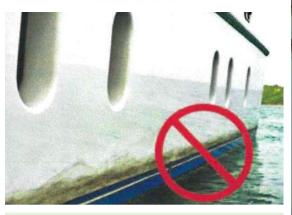
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## 2025 Caribbean Boat Yard Update

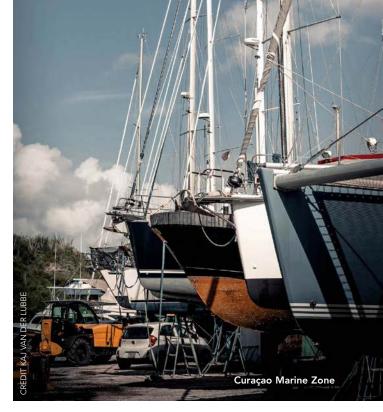

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# Stay Sun Smart While Cruising

hen do you ever feel more alive than when you're out on the ocean-immersed in the elements, feeling the sun and salty breeze on your skin while steering the boat? Once at anchor, there's a whole range of outdoor activities cruisers indulge in: snorkeling, beach walks, surfing, kite-surfing, SUPing, and, of course, less enjoyable tasks like polishing stainless bits or doing deck maintenance. Whether for hobbies or chores, the great thing about the cruising lifestyle is that we spend more time in nature than most people. But this also means we're exposed to more UV radiation—especially since sunlight reflects off the sea. Sun protection is therefore crucial on boats!

I have to admit I used to foolishly chase the perfect tan. Growing up in Austria with long, cold winters made me drop all precautions—along with all garments—in spring. I would roast myself in the sun for that perfect summer glow. Once we started cruising, I became more aware and careful, especially after we reached tropical latitudes where the sun's rays burn noticeably stronger. Suddenly the sun was no longer a pleasant source of energy but a scorching menace. Like most cruisers, we adopted the habit of wearing shirts and hats for protection.

Then Christian developed a "pimple" on his shoulder that wouldn't go away. The dermatologist in Tahiti cut it out, and the lab confirmed her diagnosis: basal cell carcinoma. This type of cancer is fortunately usually confined to the outer layer of the skin and doesn't spread, so removal was sufficient. Still, we were shaken—and resolved to be even more careful in the future.

Skin cancers are the most commonly diagnosed cancers globally, with over 1.5 million new cases annually. In 2022 alone, an estimated 330,000 cases of melanoma were reported, with nearly 60,000 deaths. One in five Americans will develop skin cancer by age 70, and more than two people die of it every





hour in the U.S. It's estimated that 95–99% of all skin cancers are caused by sun exposure—and each sunburn significantly raises melanoma risk.

With ozone levels gradually depleting around the globe, we're more exposed to harmful UV radiation. The ozone layer has thinned by approximately 5–9% since the 1960s, especially over Australia and nearby regions. As a result, nearly two out of three Australians will be diagnosed with skin cancer in their lifetime.

The Australian government and SunSmart launched a sun protection campaign back in the 1980s with a memorable slogan:

**Slip, Slop, Slap!**—Slip on a shirt, Slop on sunscreen, Slap on a hat. In 2007, they added: **Seek (shade) and Slide (on sunglasses).** 

# So, what should cruisers do to reduce their risk of skin cancer?

 Install a bimini (ideally with sides that can be lowered) and a sprayhood to shade the cockpit and keep the helmsperson cool.

- Wear long sleeves, long trousers, and a hat when going ashore or spending time on deck—especially when sitting down to work.
- Even on overcast days, up to 90% of UV rays still penetrate the clouds!
- When Christian stands bow watch, he covers up completely—shirt, hat, trousers. Some cruisers go further with hoodies, gloves, socks, and shoes to cover all skin.
- For snorkeling, we use neoprene suits (in cold water) or full-body lycra suits (in warm water), minimizing the need for sunscreen.
- Use SPF 50 sunscreen on exposed areas. Even "waterproof" types wash off eventually—ending up in the sea so make sure your sunscreen is reef-safe!
- We track moles and skin changes, and aim for an annual dermatologist check-up.
- Finally, be mindful of ozone-depleting substances. Many aerosols and older refrigeration/AC systems still contain harmful compounds. Avoid them when possible.



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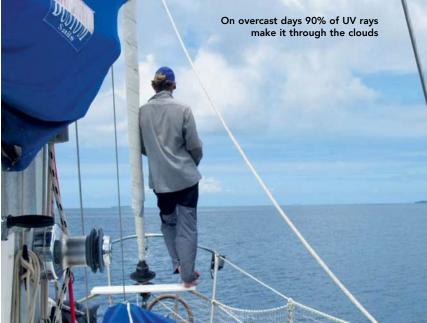
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The outlook for skin cancer is generally positive—if detected early. Basal cell and squamous cell carcinomas have high cure rates when caught in time. Melanoma, while more serious, also has a strong survival rate when diagnosed early.

So, **slip** on long clothes, **slop** on SPF 50, **slap** on a hat, **seek** shade under your bimini, **slide** on polarized sunglasses—and enjoy your time cruising!
